July Newsletter from the Bishop of Hereford

Dear Friends

June marked the 25th anniversary of Refugee Week (19 – 25th June). People were

invited to celebrate what compassion looks like in action so, I was proud to support the launch of a fundraising campaign, set up by our Diocesan Mothers' Union. They are supporting those who are seeking asylum who are currently housed at The Three Counties Hotel in Hereford. They are raising cash to offer each person the dignity of choosing basic clothing items.

Asylum Seekers are the real face of refugees in our midst – 'the stranger.' They flee their countries of origin often in fear, searching for something better, the freedom to live and eventually contribute through work. They find themselves in a strange place, reliant on the mercy and generosity of others – us.

I was reminded how vulnerable we are when we rely on the generosity of others during my recent visit to Nuremberg. The kindness and generosity of my hosts were gratefully received, and I am thankful for our strong links of friendship with the German diocese of Nuremberg which have stood the test of time for over 30 years. I was there, visiting the Evangelical Lutheran Churches biennial Kirchentag. Despite being post-Brexit, I was warmly welcomed, and Bishop Elizabeth and her husband made our stay easy. Even with our different languages, cultures and histories, we are genuinely brothers and sisters through our shared faith in Jesus Christ.

It is a healthy part of Christian discipleship to get out of our comfort zone. To be in Germany, a country I am not that familiar with, forced a certain dependence. My hosts gave me accommodation, fed me and provided a huge amount of inside information to help enrich my stay. There is a rich tradition of such Christian hospitality going back to the earliest times, particularly to foreigners and strangers.

In Deuteronomy 10 we read, "the great God mighty and awesome, who shows no partiality and accepts no bribes. He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you, yourself were foreigners in Egypt."

We have an opportunity to offer such hospitality to people who have arrived in our midst and live out the commandment in Deuteronomy 10. The writer of Deuteronomy doesn't speculate on whether the foreigners were smuggled into Israel slung under a camel. The sole criterion to help was the need.

I am very proud of our Diocesan Mothers' Union who are seeking to provide support to our refugee friends. You can still give to the clothing appeal by arranging a retiring collection at a service and donating the proceeds online or if you can donate directly, please give what you can. All the details are on the website. Please be generous.

The work of Hereford Diocese in Education

One in every four primary schools in England, and one in twenty of the secondary schools, is a Church of England School. Across the Diocese of Hereford there are 78 Church Schools, three of which are in the Wheatland News area – Brown Clee, Stottesdon and Farlow.

Canon Andrew Teale, the Diocesan Director of Education, writes a weekly bulletin on the Diocese website, which may be of interest to all teachers and parents: it is open to anyone to subscribe. As the long summer holiday races closer, we're including a page here about how the Diocese Education Team has been celebrating the end of the

school year. Here are some extracts from a recent bulletin.

"June 22nd was the day dedicated to our Year 6 children who are coming to the end of their time at primary school and preparing to the move to their new secondary school. Over 800 children from 43 of our 78 CE schools came to Hereford Cathedral. I think that is absolutely brilliant. I know it isn't possible for everyone, but it is great to see so many of our schools gathered together to worship and celebrate.

The Cathedral was filled with children who have spent their first years (perhaps all 7) in a Church of England Primary School. Most of those children will *not* be heading to a Church of England *Secondary* School. There are only three CofE secondary schools in our whole diocese, so unless they are heading to Ludlow CE School or The Bishop of Hereford Bluecoat School or The Hereford (CE) Academy, they will be going to a community secondary school. Many of these are also wonderful establishments



where children will still flourish into young adults and gain a great education. However, there will, I think it is fair to say, be less emphasis on the development of spiritual wellbeing and routes to personal faith.

Our three Church secondaries think very carefully about their distinctive and inclusive Church School ethos. The recent SIAMs** at The Hereford (CE) Academy, was a really intense process of scrutiny which examined the difference that the ethos and distinctive culture makes for the young people who attend. How well developed is the worship and prayer-life of the school? Only the CE secondary schools in the diocese go through that process. We have so few Church secondary schools, that the 'growing faith' work, which aims to combine teaching and experiences at home, in church and at school, loses one of its key anchor points. The reliance from Year 7 therefore often falls upon church and home to a large extent. Yet most of young people are not in church and have no connection to one (unless they maintain one they built while at primary school). That just leaves the option to grow faith in the home environment alone.

We don't expect our Year 6 children to have developed a fully matured faith by the time they leave primary or perhaps even secondary school, but we do aim to have given them some experience and opportunities to have an encounter with God and to gain some sense of what that feels like. They will have regularly sung songs of praise with their friends. They will have regularly prayed together. They will have been quiet together and been joyful together. They will have been called to and sent away from worship with reverence and respect. They will have enjoyed fellowship as a diverse group from different faith backgrounds and learned that they are all known and loved by God, just as they are.

June 21st was national "Thank a Teacher Day" and so a sincere, thank you all for everything you are doing in support of schools, at every level in schools across the diocese. Your work to keep our schools as places of sanctuary for every child and young person who crosses the threshold, is vitally important and will be, for many, life changing."

**The Church of England operates an inspection regime for its schools, called SIAMs – the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools.





Caring for God's Acre: Queens, sunny spots and sticky tongue

July is the month for sunshine, flowers and butterflies.

Butterflies are seen as indicators of a healthy, well managed habitat – if you have several species of butterfly, you likely have a rich variety of native plants. The UK has 59 species of butterflies – 57 resident species and two regular migrants (the Painted Lady and Clouded Yellow). Butterflies that over winter as dormant adults include Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Comma. They can often be seen in churches, chapels or outbuildings from which they emerge when the weather warms up.

While most butterflies are not choosy about what plant they obtain their nectar from, they are particular about where they lay their eggs. For example, Skippers, Meadow Brown, Gatekeeper and Ringlet all lay their eggs on grasses, while Peacock caterpillars like munching on nettles and Painted Lady on thistles. Brimstone butterflies choose buckthorn (purging or alder buckthorn), while Common Blue's caterpillars need bird's-foot trefoil, black medick, rest harrow or red clover.

Churchyards, with their mix of sunny and shaded places, can hold both grassland and woodland butterflies and if you see a butterfly high in the canopy of an oak, it is probably a Purple Hairstreak. Speckled Wood is a common find in shady places, and its caterpillars favour the coarse, tussocky grasses you might have against a wall or hedge. Commas, by contrast, prefer shorter vegetation and will be emerging in July, so look out for the distinctive wing shape and tiny white 'comma' on the underside of the wing.

Message from the Rural Dean

This will be my last 'Message from the Rural Dean' in Wheatland News. Goodness me! At the end of this month, on 24th July, we will be licensing Revd Joe Simons as Priest-in-Charge of the Brown Clee group of parishes, and three of the four vacancies in this deanery will have been filled. Bridgnorth remains, but that needs to go on into new hands. I am stepping down as RD at the end of July, and will be spending August in my own parishes, preparing them for their own vacancy which begins in September.

I have been Rural Dean since 2017, and it has been – as they say – very interesting. I am aware that the last two years of dealing with multiple vacancies has been hard on my own parishes, but they have been amazingly supportive and understanding: nobody could have foreseen the extent of change over the last four years. And I have to say as well that meeting all the people who keep our Church going, day in, day out, in all the vacant parishes has been the most extraordinary privilege. It's given me a chance to get to know the churches and their people in a way that has given me even more respect and admiration for the volunteers without whom the Church of England would disappear without trace.

The next decade or two are going to be testing times for our Church as a whole, as we try to find our place in post-post-modern (if that means anything at all!) society. Changes will be needed, and change hurts. But, as long as we try to find where God is leading us, we will come to the right place eventually, even if there's some bruising on the way.

At a vacancy consultation meeting this morning, when the people there were asked to set down the qualities they sought in their new priest-to-be, someone asked me what qualities I thought are important for what I do as a parish priest. 'Faith' I said. 'Or, better, let's go with St Paul: faith, hope and love.'

Thank you all for the faith, hope and love I've witnessed over these six years.

Saint of the Month - Mary Magdalene

July 22nd is the feast day of Mary Magdalene, possibly the most misrepresented of all New Testament characters. To begin with, forget the da Vinci code, and stories that she married Jesus after he had survived the Cross: this is a novel, a work of fiction. Forget also, quite a number of legends about her from many years earlier. She has gone down in church history as the penitent sinner, and is portrayed as a reformed prostitute. This comes from a muddle about the famous story of pouring oil on Jesus' head or feet.

There seem to be two identifiable stories of this anointing: one is of the penitent sinner washing Jesus' feet with her tears, drying them with her hair, and then anointing them with oil. The other is the anointing by Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus, at which Judas Iscariot upbraided her extravagance. In some traditions, Mary Magdalene is identified with the sinner in the first story; in others, she is identified as the same as Martha's sister. I have never been able to see how either could be justified.

Luke's gospel refers to all three women. He tells the story of the penitent sinner, to whom he gives no name and then immediately writes of Mary Magdalene, who had had seven devils cast out by Jesus, and was one of several women who supported Jesus' mission out their own means. Luke also tells a story about Mary the sister of Martha and Lazarus late in his gospel, in which he introduces Mary for the first time, with no reference back to a previous appearance.

All we actually know about Mary Magdalene from the gospels before the scenes surrounding the crucifixion is that she was healed of some ailment, which may have been physical, mental or spiritual, and that she supported Jesus' mission. It is at the crucifixion that she comes into prominence: she is mentioned as having witnessed the crucifixion and the burial, and to have been first on the scene with other women on the Sunday morning of the resurrection.

And, if I have seemed critically tetchy of some stories that have attached themselves to Mary over the years, it is because they distract our attention from her last appearance in the gospel story. It was Mary alone who hung around disconsolate before the empty tomb when everyone else had gone, so it was she who first saw Jesus on that first Easter morning. More than this, she was commissioned by him to go and tell Peter and the disciples that she had so seen him – and such a commission is what we use the word 'apostle' to describe, one who is 'sent out'.

So – not a reformed prostitute; not married to Jesus; but the first apostle of the Resurrection!



Subject - My Health - Treatment Plan

I am really looking forward to my ministry with you in the Brown Clee Benefice starting at the end of July.

It is important that you need to be made aware that I will be undergoing treatment for lymphoma, which I was diagnosed with some two years ago. The treatment will last for four to five months and will involve overnight treatment in hospital once a month.

I am not entirely certain how I will react to the treatment, but suffice to say that it is unlikely I will be quite my usual self for a while after each treatment and my capacity will be reduced.

However, it is my intention, to be present in the community, as active and visible as I can, so that I can meet you all and other members of our communities.

Sadly it will be a little while before I will be well enough to deliver fully the service rota.

I am working with Mike Teague and others to help organise cover, however I will do my best to cause as little disruption as possible.

The good news is that once the treatment is completed the prognosis is positive and I will return to full strength.

*stroke and had to go to hospital. Luckily after a brief visit to hospital, and 'passing' the health tests, Dad was allowed back to Arden Grange and that was that, for the time being.



Stroke strikes every five minutes in the UK.

It can happen to anyone, of any age, at any time. It's vital to know how to spot the signs of a stroke in vourself or someone else.

Stroke is a medical emergency. The FAST test can help you recognise the most common signs.

- Facial weakness: Can the person smile? Has their mouth or eye drooped?
- Arm weakness: Can the person raise both arms?
- **Speech problems:** Can the person speak clearly and understand what you say?
- Time to call 999: if you see any of these signs.

Make sure you and your loved ones all know the **FAST** test.



Molecule of the Month - Ketamine

etamine was first synthesised in 1962 by the chemist Calvin Stevens, working for the drug company Parke Davies. It was a derivative of a chemical discovered a few years earlier at Parke Davies called phencyclidine. This molecule was a very effective anaesthetic but also produced a long-lasting delirium, both in animal models




and humans. Parke Davies wanted a version without the delirium; clinical trials established that ketamine was significantly better and in 1970 it was approved for use in humans. Prior to that it had been approved for use in veterinary medicine.

Its great strength as an anaesthetic is that it does not slow breathing or heart rate, a common problem, and so has been considered a very safe agent for use in surgery. Ketamine works by sedating patients (i.e. sending them to sleep) but also suppresses memory and provides pain relief; this last action is particularly valued as operations inevitably produce pain. It is used for short-lasting operations and also in individuals with serious injuries; it was widely used in the Vietnam War to treat soldiers hurt on the battlefield.

The ability of ketamine to suppress pain has led to trials where it has been given at low doses to individuals who suffer from chronic pain that is resistant to conventional drugs. Recently, it has also been used in the treatment of depression. Generally depression can be treated either by behavioural therapy or a range of drugs, most of which apparently work by increasing the levels of a chemical in the brain called serotonin. This is released by nerves and

sends signals that help maintain a person's well-being. However, in a small number of cases, these therapies do not work leaving the unfortunate individuals with a poor quality of life. There is some evidence that ketamine is beneficial for these individuals. Unlike virtually every other drug used to treat depression, ketamine is effective within a few hours, although its actions also rapidly wear off. It also has other problems...

Ketamine is a drug of abuse; on the street it is known as "Special K". Whilst better than its parent compound, phencyclidine, it can still produce hallucinogenic effects. These can be countered by other drugs when it is used in surgery, but it is less clear what can be done if it is ever to be used for depression. This is an area of active research.



Ketamine produces most of its effects by reducing electrical activity in the brain. Electrical currents in the brain are caused by protein molecules called ion channels opening and closing; ketamine blocks one of these called the NMDA receptor, which is responsible for activating many nerves in the brain. However, it is less clear if this explains its effects in depression; perhaps if this were known, it might be possible to produce a derivative that did not have the hallucinogenic effects.



July Message

You will see on the cover of this edition and the notice below news about the bishop coming to Stottesdon for a confirmation service. What, you may ask, is that?

Going way back into New Testament times, John the Baptist talked about baptising people with water, and how the one who came after him would baptise with the Holy Spirit and with fire. This, of course, referred to Jesus. In the early Christian community, new members were usually adults, and they were baptised and confirmed at the same time: where baptism represented John's baptism with water; and confirmation represented baptism with the Holy Spirit, with all the associations of what happened to the disciples at Pentecost.

As time went on, baptism became a ceremony for the babies of Christian families to be baptised, and then, later, when a bishop come by on his rounds, that child would be confirmed. Baptism came to be seen as entry to the Christian community for a new child; Confirmation as the time when someone wanted to make their own declaration of belonging to that worldwide Christian community.

Confirmation consists of the bishop laying his hands on the head of the person being confirmed, and praying for the Holy Spirit to strengthen that person in their journey of faith. 'Confirmation' simply means to make strong. In the Church of England, it is the usual expectation that people who wish to join in receiving the bread and wine at the service of Holy Communion will be confirmed; but, equally, we do not turn away anyone who wishes to participate fully in that Holy Communion.

The last time we had a Confirmation service in this benefice was before Covid, and I wanted to offer another opportunity before I retire. So, if you, or anyone you know, would like to talk more about this, please get in touch by email, 'phone, or in conversation.

By the way – you may recall the Pentecost story, when the disciples heard the sound of a rushing, mighty wind, and saw tongues of fire over each others' heads; well, the special hat that a bishop wears, which is called a Mitre, is meant to represent those tongues of fire!

St Mary's Church Past Present and Future Heritage Project - Latest News

With the conservation and other building works now almost complete, here's a summary of what has been achieved so far:

Our Parish Church, built by the Normans on the Saxon site of an even earlier one, is Grade 1 Listed (meaning "of national importance") and 'Heritage at Risk'.

The restoration and conservation works, largely funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, encompassed -

- 33,000 new, hand-made tiles to replace worn-out roof coverings
- New rainwater drainage and disposal all around the building see the 'Before' and 'After' pix below!
- New oak floors/kitchen furniture to replace old 'dry-rotten' timberwork
- Upgraded lighting and heating systems installed.







Our next phase is to research and 'tell the story' of the remarkable building, which has been a place of Christian worship for over 1000 years. The community's heritage treasures here include the Font (carved just 60 years after William was 'Conqueror'); the wooden Pulpit ('Jacobean' or Guy Fawkes' time); the eagle Lectern (Crimean War era of Florence Nightingale) and the 650-year-old Medieval floor tiles, 'saved' during a previous restoration project (just 156 years ago, by the Victorians).

So, come along and chat to friendly gardeners for ideas and top tips for 'growing your own' fruit, veg and the odd floral item.

Teas, Refreshments and Plants will be available throughout **at St Mary's Parish Church** – giving everyone a first opportunity to see the stunning results of our major restoration and conservation project – enabled by substantial grant help from the National Lottery Heritage Fund; the builders, electricians and others will be finished!

Church Guided tours will take folk 'behind the scenes' but not 'up the tower' (for which we're preparing an armchair 'virtual' tour, launching later this year).
