August Newsletter from the Archdeacon of Hereford

Dear Friends



There's been a lot of walking around the Diocese recently. Bishop Richard has led walks up high places in each of our deaneries and led simple services of Holy Communion on the hills, as part of our Year of Prayer. The Golden Valley Pilgrim Way, beginning and ending at our Cathedral, has seen more and more pilgrims walking along its route. Some are doing the full 59 miles, sometimes sleeping overnight by prior arrangement in one of the churches along the way, some just doing the shorter Pilgrim Trail over two or three days, still beginning and ending in our Cathedral. The prayers offered by those pilgrims is an integral part of their pilgrimage.

My husband and I will be off to Northumberland soon, a place where we have spent many happy holidays over the years. Tides permitting, we'll probably make the pilgrimage to Holy Island again, walking barefoot across the sandy Pilgrim's Way linking Holy Island with the mainland.

Pilgrimage has a long and honoured tradition among Christians. It used to be known as peregrination or leaving one's home and wandering for the love of God.

Away from the distractions and comforts of home, in creation, it's often easier to tune into the presence of God. Praying while walking becomes a conversation, as we notice things about our surroundings, ourselves, and God which the Holy Spirit brings to our attention. We are embodied creatures, and being on the move can release emotions and thoughts that can get 'stuck' in our more sedentary day-to-day existence, all of which can be offered to God in prayer.

Not all of us are physically capable of making a pilgrimage. That need not stop us from entering into the experience either by following a pilgrim trail on YouTube or by taking an 'internal pilgrimage'. I came across this idea in a newsletter sent by someone who runs a retreat centre in Cyprus:

- Where have you been in your life? What have you done? What has happened? Whom have you met? Where has life taken you?
- Draw a meandering road on a large piece of paper.
- Record on the line significant events/times in your life through words/pictures/colour. Begin with the day you were born.
- Consider where you sense God was in each of those times close, absent, in you, in others, etc. Mark this in some way on your path.
- Consider with God anything that has come to your attention that you feel needs more pondering. If any of it has been difficult, consider discussing it with a Christian friend and praying together.

Whether your summer pilgrimage is to a local park, your own garden, or along the Camino de Santiago, may you find blessing and joy in the journey.

Caring for God's Acre - Hopping with life

Why not have a search for grasshoppers and bush-crickets in your local churchyard. Churchyards can be real havens for them as they contain a range of different habitats which may suit different species. Some are found in long or tussocky grass, some scrub and hedgerows, and some in the canopy of trees. Some burial grounds can have more than 3 grasshoppers per square foot!

The easiest way to identify grasshoppers from bush-crickets is to look at their antennae. Grasshoppers have shorter, thicker antennae compared to the antennae of crickets which are long and thin, almost hairlike. Another difference is in their habits, grasshoppers are herbivores, feeding mainly on grass as their name suggests, whilst bush-crickets eat a range of foods including aphids and small caterpillars as well as plant material. These insects have been around on the earth for a long time, they are found in the fossil record of the early Triassic, about 250 million years ago, making them the most ancient group of herbivorous, chewing insects that are still living.

Grasshoppers and crickets are tasty prey items to many larger creatures such as birds, mammals, spiders and amphibians so they have good senses to help them escape this fate. They have large, compound eyes on the sides of their heads, giving a wide field of vision, ears on either side of their abdomens and of course the antennae to sense touch. If under threat they will jump astounding distances, up to 80cm, equivalent to a human jumping the length of a football pitch.

Have a look for grasshoppers within the long and tussocky grass of your churchyard or shake a tree or shrub branch over something white like a bedsheet or plastic tray to see if any bush-crickets fall down. Showing these special creatures to children opens up a world of delight and interest.

Saint of the Month for August -Aidan of Lindisfarne

August is a good month for saints' days, topped and tailed by two of my favourites: Oswald on August 5th (see August 2022!) and Aidan on August 31st.

Oswald won the kingdom of Northumbria in battle at Heavenfield, just by the Roman wall near Hexham, in 634 AD. Unusually for those early Anglo-Saxon times he was a Christian, having lived in exile at the monastery on Iona, off the tip of the Isle of Mull. So it was to Iona that he sent for a bishop to minister to his new kingdom, and in 635 AD a party of monks, led by Aidan, arrived in the north-east, and founded their simple monastery on the tidal island of Lindisfarne.

In the account given by the Venerable Bede, there was a previous mission sent from Iona in answer to Oswald's call, but it failed: the leader of the mission found the Anglo-Saxons uncouth and unwilling to hear his message, and returned in disgust. When he reported back to the monks on Iona, Aidan suggested he had expected too much of his listeners, and that he should have begun at a much simpler level. So Aidan was sent as a replacement.

Aidan worked for nearly twenty years among the pagan Angles, gradually making Northumbria a truly Christian kingdom, so that it even survived Oswald's death in battle at Oswestry on a raid into Mercia and North Wales. Aidan was the first bishop of the area that now covers Northumberland, Durham and Yorkshire, and was noted for his humility. He preferred to walk around his vast diocese so that he could talk to anyone he met on their own level. When one of Oswald's successors, Oswin, gave him a horse to get around more quickly, Aidan gave it away to the first beggar he met, harness, trappings and all.

The monastery that Aidan founded became a centre of learning and mission, with such names as St Chad and St Wilfrid among its distinguished members and St Cuthbert as one of its priors and bishops. Recent excavations on the Holy Island of Lindisfarne have revealed the possible site of that monastic community on the raised ground known as The Heugh adjoining the island's harbour.

The royal headquarters of Oswald and his successors was at Bamburgh, just down the coast and within sight of Lindisfarne, and it was there, outside the church he founded, that Aidan died in the year 654.

Aidan is, quite simply, my historical hero above all others: a Christian of simplicity, humility and holiness and a model for all Christian ministers for all time.



Molecule of the Month - Compound 69 and the 5HT2a receptor



ne of the major challenges faced by the pharmaceutical industry is to deliver new drugs to treat conditions where existing therapies do not work as well as we would like. There are particularly large gaps in the treatment of mental health, especially conditions. Underlying these are imbalances in brain biochemistry, especially a chemical released by nerves called variously serotonin or 5-hydroxytryptamine, usually shortened to 5HT. This is released to promote activity in the parts of our brain that give feelings of contentment and well-being; feelings that are largely absent in those who suffer from long-term depression or anxiety. There are good treatments available for depression, but unfortunately there are a number of people who do not respond to these. For them, life can be very dark.

It has been known anecdotally that some of these people seem to respond well to mind-altering drugs of abuse, such as LSD. However, it would be a brave/foolish clinician who prescribed LSD or similar psychedelic agents to a depressed patient; the depression might be alleviated, but the resulting psychoses ("bad trips") could be worse. And so the field has gone nowhere.

It has been known for some years that LSD works by mimicking the effects of 5HT on one of the proteins that nerves produce to respond to it; a protein called the 5HT2a receptor. This protein can activate nerve cells when LSD binds to it, but perhaps not quite in the same way as 5HT itself. LSD activates a set of reactions in nerve cells that are mediated by a protein called beta-arrestin; 5HT can additionally activate what are termed "G proteins" to produce a somewhat different pattern of activity in nerves. Could this help us to design new drugs that act at the 5HT2a receptor without the undesirable actions of LSD?

Very recent data suggests this might be possible. In a large-scale collaboration between chemists, pharmacologists, computer scientists and behavioural specialists, computers were used to generate 75 million (!) different chemical structures, based on our knowledge of what was likely to be a good drug and could perhaps interact with the 5HT2a receptor. Then, using 1000 computers, each of these chemicals was examined to see if it was likely that it could bind to a computer model of the 5HT2a receptor. At the end, 17 of the structures showed enough promise to be actually made by chemists and tested in the laboratory. After further rounds of refinement, both using computers and at the lab bench, two agents emerged that looked promising; compounds 69 and 70. Compound 69 was examined carefully in animals that showed signs of depression or anxiety; it alleviated these without showing any evidence for causing psychoses. Biochemically, it seems to activate G proteins rather than beta-arrestins, in line with expectations.

The real test will come when Compound 69 or an analogue is used in patients in clinical trials. None-the-less, that story so far is very promising and shows what can now be achieved by a combination of modern computing and traditional laboratory approaches. Only by using a computer could we possibly investigate so many potential drugs. As an aside, with colleagues at Aston and Coventry universities and in a project funded by the Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council (BBSRC), we are developing new computer methods that better predict how drugs activate cells, in line with what seems to have been a key finding in this project.

August Message

I was musing in a sermon towards the end of July about new beginnings. I had been involved in a baptism, a confirmation, a wedding, a licensing of a new priest-in-charge and the handing over of the role of Rural Dean. Alongside this, the Church of England is wrestling with how to fit in with the modern world. It is a time of change in so many ways; but every change is a new beginning and every new beginning is a new opportunity.

To my mind, the great strength of the Church of England is that it is there for everyone when they need it. Some people like their weekly worship in the village church; some people like to drop in occasionally; some people only need it in times of particular rejoicing or particular grief. Many people find it a safe haven to come back to when the busy-ness of life eases off. But the parish system provides everyone with a church they can call their own, and a vicar they can get to know. Thus, when there is a need, neither the place nor the person is a stranger to the one in need.

The village church is a community building. When I have taken services for the children in our schools or helped with curriculum enrichment projects in their parish churches, I have always been careful to welcome them to their church. When people have come to celebrate their weddings and their baptisms, I have welcomed them, and thanked their friends and families for being there to support them. The churches can so easily be seen as mysterious and somehow threatening to those who are not used to them, with strange language and strange ceremonies: but, actually, they belong to you, the people of the parishes.

This is most noticeable at the main festivals – particularly Harvest and Carol Services – but also at community events like coffee mornings and Harvest Suppers. It will be increasingly evident at Stottesdon as the Heritage Lottery community events are rolled out now that the building work is completed. But it is there, as well, in the people who drop in to the church on their own, either for a look round or to step aside from the everyday, for a little while spent with the eternal.

It has been a time of great joy and privilege to serve these parishes, but my term of office as Rector finishes on September 3rd, when we shall have a thanksgiving service at Stottesdon. This will not be a Communion service, because I want it to be equally open to all. There will then be a new beginning for us, and for you. A new opportunity.


