

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Editorial

This month's magazine has many articles and information about the Harvest services taking place across the benefices.

When sitting in doors watching the torrential rain during the last few weeks two sayings from my childhood came to mind - 'Rain, rain go away, come again another day' and 'Incy, wincy spider climbed up the spout, down came the rain and washed the spider out, out came the sunshine and dried up all the rain, incy, wincy spider up the spout again'! Knowing that this is now the time when spiders come indoors I felt sorry for them in this topsy turvy weather pattern we have at present. A difficult time to know what to do and where to be! This brought more memories and the problems of the people working in any form of harvest – the farmers who took advantage of the recent very warm days and nights and who spent most of the time trying to catch up with haymaking, silage and planting, not getting much sleep, only to find that a few days later the rains came again and in some parts of the country the newly sown seeds and even potatoes were washed away in the torrential downpours and subsequent floods. Then there are the wine makers whose vines have been lashed with the storms, trying to get the grapes harvested to start the fermenting process. The bee-keepers whose bees were unable to get out to collect the pollen to make the honey. Then there are the people in villages and towns which have had severe flooding and in some cases contamination of the water supply. In the Bishop's message this week he said we should – "give thanks *in* all circumstances but not *for* all circumstances.....".

This month we shall be celebrating the Harvest in services across the country, singing hymns and praying for the people who work tirelessly to make sure we have food and fluid to continue to live the life to which we have become accustomed. As we enjoy the fruits of the land let us think about the people who toil and the long hours they work and, in the light of the changing weather patterns, not take anything for granted.


Wheatland News reaches another milestone as it publishes the 30th Molecule if the Month on page 17 with an interesting article about the Tasmanian Devil.

There you are, hurtling through the lanes in your car on some mission of huge national importance, muttering venomously at cyclists in helmets shaped like wasps' bottoms, inconsiderate enough to want a bit of your road, rounding a bend and coming up behind the ponderous majesty of a tractor and trailer. On closer inspection over the next ten minutes, you conclude that it is actually a convoy of three tractors and two trailers and the glory of the aforementioned ponderous majesty begins to wear a bit thin! Hoorah. It is harvest time again. And I would wager a considerable sum that most of you do not at this point start singing songs of everlasting thanks and praise to our great God for his generous provision, or blessing the farmers for the work they do to put food on our plates!


So here is your challenge for harvest and beyond. I've learned to do it and if I can manage it anyone can. If you get stuck on your travels behind a tractor or a combine or a plough or any other mysteriously shaped implement of the sod, (by which I mean, of course, the soil!) take it as an opportunity for reflection, for thanksgiving and for praise.

Why should you bother? Firstly, because praising God for what he gives us should become a matter of habit in all of us and secondly because as a nation we owe a huge debt of gratitude to the farmers who are taken totally for granted by most of us who have become emotionally and practically detached from the source of our food.

We cannot and must not take national food security as a given. Climate change and population growth mean that it is more difficult to produce enough grain for the world's needs. The situation in Ukraine is calamitous for the food security of millions in vulnerable nations. Global markets will sell to the highest bidder regardless of need. Political mismanagement and the power of global enterprise in the inherently local business of food production are putting countless family farms out of business.

So when you get stuck behind that tractor take a deep breath, smile and wave at the farmer, even if he does stare back at you with blank amazement and ask for God's blessing on his family and work. Reflect on our corporate relationship to food and the land as the God given source of all our well-being and praise God from whom all blessings flow.

And if the vicar rushes in late to take your service on a Sunday morning you will understand why! Happy harvest to you all. I hope to see some of you at your harvest service.

Garden aler!! A lot of the hints and tips for our churchyards are just as relevant and useful for our own gardens!

The Caring for God's Acre (CfGA) team has just launched a series of online talks (webinars) that look very useful and interesting. Caring for God's Acre - Spying on your secret visitors!

Would you like to know what creatures visit your local churchyard when no one is about? How about setting up a simple camera trap to find out. These can be purchased at specialist suppliers – the Natural History Book Service or NatureSpy for example, costing between £100 and £200. Perhaps a cluster of churches could buy one together?

To set up a trap, first find your location. It needs to be low to the ground so as to pick up small animals such as hedgehogs. Short grass is best, to avoid waving vegetation which will set off the camera which is activated by movement. The camera itself needs to be attached to something robust such as a tree, pole or building. Find a relatively secluded place where it is unlikely to be noticed by visitors, these cameras tend to be in camouflage colours and are rarely spotted, particularly if surrounded by vegetation or deadwood. Try to locate the camera in a place that animals are likely to use, along the line of a hedge or wall for example. Placing the camera to face a shallow dish with water in it might reveal many creatures stopping for a drink or a bathe, particularly in hot weather. You may even put out some food such as cat food or peanut butter to attract hungry visitors!

There is plenty of information on using camera traps on the internet, a little research will help you choose the right one for you. Once in place the camera will need checking and the video footage or photos can be downloaded and batteries recharged. Seeing what has visited is great fun, particularly enjoyable for people who might have reduced mobility so are less able to watch wildlife directly. Of course once purchased the camera need not only be used within your churchyard, it will shed light on the wildlife to be found in other churchyards or cemeteries, in gardens, school grounds and other locations, particularly at nighttime. You might expect to see birds and mammals such as mice, voles and squirrels. Foxes are likely visitors and hedgehogs cover a large area in the night so may well stop by, particularly if you are offering something tasty to eat!

If you do run a camera trap, please have a go at using the footage to make biological records via iNaturalist or iRecord, that way we can build a better picture of how important churchyards are for wildlife, and churchyard management can be tweaked to support the animals that you discover, many of which may depend on this special place.

Saint of the Month for October -St James the Deacon

On 11th October we celebrate the life and work of James the Deacon.

James is man who has particular resonance for a church that sees ministry and mission as the calling of the whole Church of Christ. He is the saint for any lay person who has stepped in to lead their

church when the clergy are far away, something which we have become accustomed to across a few of our churches in the past and likely to in the days to come.

Pope Gregory had sent Paulinus, Bishop of York, on a mission to take Roman Christianity to Northumbria: James was likely to have been part of that group. James became a figure of constancy and reliability, at a time of political instability.

The foundations of the mission were successful. Edwin the king of Northumbria was converted, and Roman Christianity in Northumbria was established and began to grow. It was not all plain sailing: in 633 Edwin died in battle against the King of Mercia Penda, a ruthless pagan king. A backlash followed and the queen and her son fled for Kent, joined by the bishop Paulinus.

James was the only vestige of Roman Christianity left in Northumbria, now a solitary deacon.

Despite the dangers of Penda, James took his stand and stayed in a village near Catterick, often risking his life as he cared for the Christians and continued to preach the gospel.

His efforts were recognised when the Northumbrian mission returned several years later and found an active Christian community still in Northumbria. James had been a faithful and true servant to the gospel.

Once Penda died, and Christian rule was re-established in Northumbria, James taught music, including Gregorian Chant, to the young churches in the area. Bede acknowledged him for his honour and integrity. James was present at the Synod of Whitby in 664, which met to discuss the differences between the Celtic Northumbrian Church of the North, and the Roman Church of the South.

When James died, sometime late in the 7th century, he had left his mark and his passing was deeply mourned by the ordinary Christians of Northumbria, both Celtic and Roman. He had never deserted them in their time of need and had continued to proclaim Christ despite the dangers.

Margaret Moreton - 1935 - 2023

The church was packed – standing room only - with many friends from throughout her whole life. Many WN readers will remember Margaret: her sons Paul, Martin and Ian shared this extract from the eulogy

"Margaret was a big fan of playing card games, listening to "Dick Barton Special Agent" and "The Archers" on the radio, and going to the local dances held at the village hall. She also spent quite a lot of time all the way up until when she died watching sports

on the TV, including football, cricket, horseracing and tennis.

This love of sport runs all the way through the family, including her grandchildren. She had seven grandchildren – Sarah, Katie, Sophie, Bethany, Harvey and Oscar; as well as two great-grandchildren: Arrabella and Payton. She would regularly go to watch her

grandchildren playing sport, including cricket, horse riding and swimming. Anytime any of these sporting achievements made the paper, she always ensured to cut out a copy of the article as a keepsake and kept all of these safe for her to look through and share with others.

Another of Margaret's favourite things to do involving her family was the regular family get-togethers, especially at Christmas. Sometimes this would involve going to the Down, or at one of the family's homes, where there was often a fantastic spread of food, mostly put together by Margaret (especially her cakes and trifle) but also by her daughters-in-law for the whole family to enjoy together.

In her later years, Margaret and Ed moved into a bungalow, where Ed sadly passed away in 2015. It was during this time that Margaret started to become ill, so Ian moved in to help her, and other family members also helped out in a number of ways where needed. It was here that she stayed up until her death in August and she will be very much missed by family, friends and various members of the community."

Winners of the various competitions are too numerous to mention – congratulations to them all!



Molecule of the Month - a vaccine to save Tasmanian Devils!

enerally, in this column I focus on molecules that are relevant to human health. However, we are encouraged to think more broadly about the importance of all species that are part of the natural world; using vicar's jargon, the "created" world, even if I recognise the creation of different plants and animals has taken place by the forces behind evolution. So this month, spare a thought for the Tasmanian Devil.

As its name suggests, the Tasmanian Devil is a rather fierce animal that lives on the island of Tasmania, off the coast of Australia. Like all native mammals found in Australia is a marsupial; it bears its young in a pouch, like a Kangaroo. The Devil can be thought of as an equivalent to a wild hunting dog or a wolf, neither of which are native to Australia. It is a meat eater (carnivore) and will hunt and kill other animals or birds for food, although it is equally at home eating animals that have already died. Indeed, whilst it can take livestock such as sheep from farms, it can perform the farmer a useful service by completing devouring the carcass of any animal that has died. The Devil is the largest surviving marsupial carnivore.

The Devil seems to have originally been found all over Australia but was hunted to extinction; it now only survives on Tasmania. It was made a protected species

in 1941 and has become a symbol of the island. However, over the last thirty or so years it has come under threat from an disease, Devil Facial Tumour Disease (DFTD). This is an unusual disease; it is an infection that is spread from one animal to another when they bite and scratch each other in fights over food but it is also a form of cancer. The animals develop large growths on their faces which eventually kill them. The disease has spread and there are real fears it could cause the Devils to become extinct.

Normally cancerous cells express a protein on their surface belonging to a family called the Major Histocompatibility Class 1 (MHC-1). The MHC-1 proteins are recognised by cells of the immune system and signal to it cells that are abnormal and need to be destroyed. However, the tumour cells express very few MHC-1 proteins, meaning that the immune system cannot recognise them. As a result, the tumour goes unchallenged. Building on technology used to develop Covid vaccines, scientists from Hobart in Tasmania have now used adenoviruses to transfer DNA into tumour cells to make them produce large amounts of MHC-1. The adenovirus is a fairly harmless virus that is used by scientists to introduce DNA into target cells; the DNA contains the molecular instructions that cause a cell to produce any protein that the scientists chose. In this case, it is a form of MHC-1 that

So far, the approach has only been used in small scale tests, but the results are promising. To scale it up, it is hoped

to lace food with the adenovirus, so that when the Devils eat this, they will also take the virus into their bodies and inoculate themselves.

Science often works in unpredictable ways; a disease that has killed millions of humans worldwide may now give us tools to save an endangered species. We are an Eco-church at Billingsley....

Congratulations to Ann!

The editor writes:

Ann Constable has been formally commissioned by Archdeacon Fiona as a Local Worship Leader

The Certificate shown in this picture reads: "Commissioned as a local worship leader to serve the benefice of Stottesdon with Farlow, Cleeton St Mary, Silvington, Sidbury and Middleton Scriven. For a period of 3 years."

This is a tremendous achievement, Ann, and must have involved a lot of hard work and study.

Ann will now be able to lead some of our services, including the Harvest celebration at Middleton Scriven on 22nd October, and also the Christmas Eve Carols.

Sharing historic news with our neighbouring parishes, Chetton and Glazeley:

In Middleton Scriven church a beautiful wreath was laid by the family of Sgt. William Shepherd (Uncle Willy) to commemorate his tragic death on his 21st birthday, 80 years ago. The wreath was in memory of five young airman (3 British, 1 Canadian and 1 Australian) who lost their lives in a tragic aircraft crash at Eudon Mill, Bridgnorth on 8th September 1943. The crash site lies in the Chetton parish, and is close to both the adjacent parishes of Middleton Scriven and Glazeley.

The young men were:

- Sgt. William Shepherd. RAF (Pilot) from Edinburgh
- Sgt. Francis George Wells. RAF (Navigator) from Birmingham
- 🕏 Sgt. George D H Morrow. Royal Canadian Air Force (Bomb aimer), from Saskatchewan, Canada
- Sgt. Walter Henry Lawrence. RAF. (wireless, air gunner) from Walthamstow, Essex
- 🕆 Sgt. Norman Leslie Wachter. Royal Australian Air Force (Air Gunner) from Kenmore, Queensland, Australia.

This flight was due to have been their last training flight before converting to Lancasters and going on operation. It was a training flight from RAF Chipping Warden, for their Wellington 111 aircraft, which took off at 21:52 on a night

cross country bombing / navigation exercise.

Their flight plan should have taken them to from Chipping Warden, Somerton, Port Isaac, Somerton, Chipping Norton, Conway Castle, Leominster then back to base, where they were due back at 02:52.

Their last message was received at 23:43. At 00:29 the plane crashed. No distress call had been received.

It was reported to have dived vertically into Eudon Mill and exploded. This was on the land now owned by John Fox. All died, and sadly only three bodies were recovered. Two are remembered with honour on the Runnymede memorial and three have war graves in Chester (Blacon) cemetery.



It is reported the crew had a short leave just prior to the accident. Francis Wells had met his mother in a pub in Shrewsbury. William Shepherd, the pilot, was 21 on the day he died.

The subsequent court of enquiry stated various factors that might have contributed to the crash. Historically it is now known that it was sadly a time when many aircraft were in a sorry state, and many airmen had recent flying duties which amounted to a very large amount of hours.

The names of these five young men are read out at the Remembrance service at Glazeley church each year now thanks to the research on the crash completed by our local historian Lyn Parnaby.
