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Editorial

November has been a difficult month for many people, and we hold in our prayers the families and friends of the four boys from Shrewsbury who tragically lost their lives in an accident.

As we build up to the Christmas period, we remember the families and those we love and pray for peace throughout the world.

We congratulate and pray for Bishop Richard as he takes on his new appointment as "Clerk of the Closet to His Majesty King Charles" - a role which will see him head up the Ecclesiastical Household, with oversight of the College of Chaplains and responsibility to introduce new diocesan bishops to the Sovereign. This is a role which has existed since 1432. The 'closet' is the ancient name for a Royal Chapel. The role carries an annual nominal salary of £7!



Bishop Richard said, "I was surprised and honoured to be offered this ceremonial role, which dates back to 1437. I am thankful to those who have gone before me and who have graciously shared their wisdom." The Bishop has also received his writ of summons to the House of Lords, where he will join the other Lords Spiritual from the New Year. He sums up, "The day just has just become a lot busier and I will need to carefully balance my duties to serve the diocese as well as these national responsibilities. I am very grateful for the many people who continue to hold me in prayer."

We rejoice in the arrival of Revd Joe and Revd Kina, and wish them good health and happiness for 2024.



Christmas Newsletter from the Bishop of Hereford



Dear Friends,

In court, juries will be suspicious if all the witnesses come up with the same story. Their role is to weigh up accounts to discern where the truth lies.

In most situations its remarkable how diverse people's perceptions of events can be. Such variation adds to the credibility of a story. This is especially true of the Christmas story in the Bible. The events are examined from a variety of angles. Diverse witnesses provided the source material for the Gospel writers to distil their accounts. We have an angle from Kings, Shepherds, and theologians keen to analyse things in the light of what God had already said through prophets hundreds of years previously. In the centre of the story is Mary, the young peasant girl in her teens, who finds herself inexplicably pregnant.

Her response is the exemplar of what it is to be a follower of Jesus. The angel tells her what is about to happen with only the sketchiest discussion of the personal implications. Her response is, "may it be unto me as you have said."

Confronted with the reality of God, her answer is, "yes, now what is the question."

She is in a long line of heroes of faith who exemplify unconditional obedience. Isaiah, confronted with a vision of God said, "here am I send me." The disciples required just a word from Jesus to leave everything and follow him. St Paul was struck blind on the road to Damascus and meekly waited for what God was to tell him he must do.

We are coming to the end of our year of prayer in the diocese and moving to the year of faith. As we begin that journey together, Mary's, "yes, now what is the question?" is a good place to start. The Gospel was described by Rowan Williams as news not advice. The events of Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection stand at the turning point of history inviting us to respond with our own unconditional, "yes!"

Saint of the Month - Saint Stephen

Stephen was appointed as one of a number of deacons or servants in the early Church. His task was primarily to assist with the orderly running of the church, although his giftings lay in other directions. He was prepared to speak with candour and honesty about what he believed to be the truth.

Have you ever thought about how far you would go to witness to what you believe in? As Christian's are we willing to witness to what God has done in our lives? Are we willing to be misunderstood or criticized? Are we willing to have our lives put in danger for our faith?



St Stephen was not ashamed to share his faith with others. When opposition arose, Stephen was seized and taken before the religious authorities the Sanhedrin. In response to their questions about whether he was guilty of blasphemy, Stephen preached an eloquent Gospel sermon. Words that ultimately led to him being stoned to death. Stephen was not intimidated, for he was full of the Holy Spirit he saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God to welcome him home.

You wonder what kind of a world it must have been where godly people like Stephen can be murdered by religious bigots. Maybe there are some lessons to learn for us in our own times.


This event had a profound effect on one bystander, Saul or as we know him Paul, he never forgot the event, and no doubt Stephen's message, prayers, and glorious death were used to prepare Saul for his own meeting with the Lord.

It is said that God never wastes the blood of His saints. Saul would one day see the same glory that Stephen saw and would behold the Son of God and hear Him speak!

Message for Advent and Christmas

In our world where there is so much that seems hopeless, we can often struggle to see how the end game will play out. But the message from the Old Testament prophets especially Isaiah tells a different story - dry land shall blossom, eyes will be opened, the blind will see, deaf ears unstopped, the lame leap, tongues shall sing, wildernesses stream with water and so on. It is a message of hope and endurance, recognising change is coming and that which is holding us captive we will be released from, free to live in a new way.

It is very easy for us to get caught up in the softness of the message of the Christ child born in humble circumstances and create an image that focusses on forgiveness and salvation but that does not herald a different way of living. A life centred around Christ that puts the Holy Way at the heart of our being. John the Baptist preached a message of repentance or change washed clean by the waters of the Jordan and Jesus as the fulfilment of that change.

John chose to decrease in importance as Christ increased, he chose to be nothing so that Jesus could be everything.

Love lies at the heart of the Christian faith a willingness to serve to the Glory of the one we are serving and through our service to be bathed in the life-giving light of Christ.

So as we move on into this advent season let us look at the world around us our families, friends, those we can relate to and those that are more challenging, are we on the Holy Way?

Maybe we are feeling weak and feeble and fearful, are we ready to be reborn in Christ this Christmas?

It is OK to be ordinary, it is OK to know that we are week, feeble and frightened as ordinary people but we can take comfort through the good news of Jesus Christ, that we can do extraordinary things, so much more than we can imagine. If we prepare the way for Christ at this Christmas and allow Christ to enter into our hearts, we will be on the Holy Way a source of real joy and celebration.

Happy Christmas and a peaceful and hope-filled New Year.

Benefice Memorial Service





What Lies Beneath?

Robin Greenwell writes:

What a fantastic turnout to the latest Ditton Priors Local History Group event on Tuesday 14th November! And what an absolutely fascinating presentation from local detectorist David Rann!

'What Lies Beneath' provided a real insight into the world of metal detecting and the



amazing artefacts David

has discovered in and around Ditton Priors. Many of these were on display - including the Brown Clee Hoard (a collection of 8 'long cross' silver coins dating from 1327-1377), a mediaeval silver spoon and many many more fascinating finds!

The group would like to extend a big thank you to everyone who came along and supported the event - it was a real pleasure to see everyone and we hope you all enjoyed the evening. And also of course ...a huge thank you to David Rann for his excellent and insightful presentation!



We tend to ignore holly trees until December, when they brighten up our churchyards, as well as our churches and homes at Christmas time, with their shiny leaves and bright berries. For the rest of the year they are less conspicuous, with dark green leaves, dark brown bark and small white flowers in the spring. Holly is an interesting tree however. Before botanists brought tree seeds from other

countries to our shores, winter foliage was unusual, and all evergreen trees were viewed as special. Use of holly and yew branches for winter decoration is an old custom, probably a mix of a wish to make the place look festive, coupled with superstition. Holly was believed to be a fertility symbol and a charm against witches, goblins and the devil. It was thought unlucky to cut down a holly tree.

Holly has good natural defences with the leaves of a young holly extremely prickly. As the tree matures, the prickles reduce, particularly on higher branches, out of reach of most browsing animals. Holly trees are dioecious meaning that there are male and female trees with the decorative berries only found on the female of course. Holly berries are a vital food source for birds and small mammals such as wood mice and dormice. In some cases, mistle thrushes will vigorously defend a particularly choice holly tree from other birds so have a look in your local burial ground and see if you see a flurry of activity.

If you would like to start digitally recording wildlife in your local burial ground then why not use a churchyard holly tree to get going. Take a look on our website under Be Involved or click here: caringforgodsacre.org.uk/add-your-records to find out what to do. You will need to download the iNaturalist app onto a mobile phone, tablet or laptop. It's helpful to start recording with a familiar species and something that is easy to photograph. Maybe you have children or grandchildren in need of outdoor activities in the Christmas holidays? This could be a way to start exploring the wonderful wildlife to be found in churchyards, chapel yards and cemeteries.

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Molecule of the Season - beta-Carotene

Not quite the molecules of Christmas dinner.

This article is about the chemistry of carrots. I will grant you carrots don't have quite the same seasonal resonance as sprouts, turkey and stuffing, but they are in the scientific news thanks to some recent research looking at how humans have selected for particular characteristics.



- Carrots are orange.
- Carrots are good for you.
- Carrots make you see in the dark. To disguise the Allies' use of radar, during WWII the RAF started a rumour that carrots improved pilots' night vision.....

Strictly speaking, only the first two of those statements are correct.

However, carrots are rich in an orange-coloured chemical called beta-carotene (below). In the body, this is converted

to vitamin A, also called retinol. This helps to protect the body from toxic substances called free radicals, which arise in every cell as they use oxygen to produce energy.

shape (*left*). This property is used by cells in the eye to allow us to see objects. There are a number of foods that supply us with beta-carotene, but carrots are a simple way we can get it and cheaper than vitamin pills.

Retinol also responds to light by changing

For clarity - the terms 'cis' and 'trans' refer to the structure of molecules — in this case the direction in which the molecule is twisted to the right of the orange dot.

A group of scientists led by Kevin Coe at North Carolina State University have looked at the genes of both wild and modern carrots. The genes are the instructions that direct cells to make particular proteins; in this study they primarily looked at the proteins that tell carrots how to make and store carotene. From this, they have been able to understand how farmers have, over a millennium, produced the carrots we now eat; the way genetic engineering has been for centuries without knowing it.

The ancestors of our current carrot grow wild in Asia. It seems likely that around the 9th or 10th century, these first found their way into the vegetable garden. The wild carrots are yellow and become woody and inedible once they flower. The story of domestication revolves around steps to change these traits. Once the carrot reached Western Europe, farmers began to look out for plants that were orange rather than yellow; they especially collected and used seeds from these examples. Without realising it, they were picking plants that had particularly marked activity in three genes that instructed the carrot cells to accumulate the orange-coloured carotene. They also looked for plants that had delayed flowering. In this case, they ended up picking examples where the genes that instructed the plants to produce flowers were only slowly acting. Thus we ended up with the vegetables that may accompany the sprouts on the Christmas table.

A Prayer from St Mary's, Highley



This week, in addition to praying for Kina and her family, I would like to suggest you consider praying for a named individual, Mohammed Ghalayini. Mo is a friend of one of our church members from Glazeley. He has lived in Manchester (where he is a civil servant) ever since University, and went over for a family reunion just before Hamas attacked Israel, only the third time he's been able to visit in 20 years. He is trapped in Khan Younis, and when he got to the Rafah crossing wasn't able to get into Egypt as his name was not on the list of British Palestinian nationals. This extract, from an interview with him done a couple of days ago by a reporter, shows the situation he is in. It will also be that of the 240 Israeli hostages held prisoner. Remember them

all in your prayers.

Reporter: Mohammed, I believe you, you just heard some explosions. Can you tell us what happened? MOHAMMED GHALAYINI: Like, there's always Israeli aircraft circling above Gaza. There's, like, fighter jets circling. And just maybe 20 minutes ago, I think one of them dropped a bomb. We didn't, like, it, it's sad to say, but it's become so normalized that we don't even, like, look to check where the bombing is coming unless it's really close to you.

Reporter: Where are you right now? How are you keeping safe? MG: I'm very lucky to be in an apartment with 16 of my family members. About four or five to a room. We still, we are struggling, struggling to get water. Water is our biggest struggle. Power is also a big struggle. I guess, in terms of keeping safe, it's really, you know, hard to say we're doing anything ourselves to keep us safe because our safety is not in our hands. Our safety is at the will and whim of the Israeli Air Force, and so is the safety of 2.3 million other Palestinians in Gaza.


Memories of Billingsley

Ann Key (Ann Broome) recalls:

I lived on Bynd Lane in one of the temporary bungalows and so did her grandparents and aunt she remembers the Cook family lived at Cheslyn.

Mr. Cook collected the rent from the tenants on Bynd Lane and his mother paid six and six rent per week. The Mullards lived at Mount Pleasant. Miss Hinton lived at Wyre House and took in lodgers; Mrs Shrimpton lived in the bungalow now known as "Ithaca" - she was an ex-nurse and administered to all the villagers' illnesses, taking them to the doctor or hospital if needed in her Austin A7 car. Miss Layton kept the shop: this was at the far end of the Pavilion and was in existence until 1977. You could buy everything you needed from the shop! The Pavilion, or parish room, was a long low building situated opposite Prospect House. Whist drives and dances were held here: it was an existence until the late 1950s, for Ann and Fred held their wedding reception in it. The Greens lived in New Buildings and Bryans at Bank Farm. Lincoln Fields housing estate was a cow pasture in Anne's courting days with a very convenient gateway for a goodnight kiss!!

Ann's enduring memories of Billingsley are of a very happy, close-knit community where everyone knew each other and all were willing to help in any way they could.



Margaret Byford (nee Cook) continues the Memories of Billingsley

The Cook family originally lived in Scot's Cottages, just over the brook into the Stottesdon parish. These cottages no longer exist. The Cooks came up to Bind Lane around 1917. Jim Cook was born in Mount Pleasant and Margaret was born in Cheslyn, so she feels sure that these two houses were originally one dwelling. Cheslyn / Mount Pleasant was probably the colliery manager's house, and Wyre House would have been for the under-manager. Apart from Prospect House, the remaining houses on Bind Lane were temporary

prefabricated buildings with corrugated iron roofs. They were temporary housing for the mine workers, although some people have suggested they were for refugees returning after the First World War. The last of these 'temporary' buildings disappeared within the past few years so they stood the test of time well.

Originally all these houses and the land belonged to Lord Barnard. Margaret's father had the task of collecting the weekly rent from the tenants and sending it to Mr Eade at Uffington near Wellington. She remembers that the weekly rent for Cheslyn was 7/- and likewise for Wyre House.

The houses and land were finally sold off individually in the 1950s. The Mullards did not wish to purchase Mount Pleasant so the Cook family bought it along with Cheslyn.

The pit had closed by the time Margaret was born but she remembers it as being a wonderful playground for children you were free to wander anywhere and everywhere. The pit mound was especially good for sledging down!!

Billingsley children attended Deuxhill School. In the 1930s the school averaged 80 pupils ranging in age from 5 to 14 years. The infants were taught in the small room, and the larger room was divided into two by a wooden partition. This was for the older children. Mr Owen was the headmaster.

Revd Turner was a vicar at Billingsley in the early '30s, and a wooden cover for the font is dedicated to his memory. Margaret remembers that he had a thriving Sunday school. Her father was a churchwarden for many years and she played the organ during the Second World War.

Billingsley received evacuees from Wallasey. Most families took someone in: the Cook family took in one and the Broomes took in two.

Whist drives and dances were held in the pavilion at this time to raise money for the returning village boys. About seven young men from the village were involved in the war including the Fernihough brothers, Arthur Layton and Margaret's brothers. The pavilion was also the venue for many of the village wedding receptions. Her grandfather Cook owned an orchard and grew Longmore pears in it. The locals called it Cook's orchard, and it was the site of the original post office. Margaret's father sold the orchard, and a house has since been built on it which we now know as Longmore House. Margaret's grandparents on her mother's side (the Turley's) kept the Cape of Good Hope at around the turn of the century. She says that her grandmother did a lot of cooking and put on many suppers.

Margaret has many happy memories of Billingsley including the family walks, but the real treat was to attend the cricket matches at Chorley where the family would meet up with their other relatives. Of course Nipper Cook was her father's cousin - he was the well-known poacher! There are many tales of his exploits.....

In Margaret's time Mrs Shrimpton kept the post office followed by the Harrisons. Williams's were at Hall Farm, George Mellings at Church Farm, Bryans at Bank Farm, Fernihoughs at the Hook. Mrs Layton kept the shop and Margaret remembers Sid Fry (who used to be verger) as the gentleman that batted his eyes and got his words mixed up! Even now, when someone says "cremated" she thinks of Sid saying "cream-e-ated" and has to smile! Happy memories.

There is a Longmore House in Billingsley. And the improved Longmore Pear is listed (no photograph) in the inventory of the National Fruit Collection at Brogdale.

Mapping Church Burial Grounds

Readers may recall that Caring for God's Acre advertised a series of autumn webinars on various topics. One of these topics was 'Mapping Church Burial Grounds', which took place on 31 October. This webinar, attended by about 100 people from all over the country, turned out to be even more interesting and important than I had imagined possible when I signed up to attend. The National Burial Grounds Survey will no doubt transform the lives of ecologists, local and family historians – and churchwardens too. Churchwardens most of all, maybe.

You can read more about it on the AGIntl website – agintl.org – from which the grey panel here is a screenshot. Do have a look, because it sets out a lot of important detail about the aims and the methodology of the survey.

What I heard was a description of an exciting, impressive, long-overdue and extremely ambitious seven-year programme to that will have the potential completely to transform the knowledge, the understanding, the history, the ecological management and the protection of our churchyards. The work so far has also increased the level of public interest and engagement, in particular with local schools.

What Is The National Burial Grounds Survey?

The National Burial Grounds Survey (NBGS) is the first project of its kind anywhere in the world.

AG Intl Ltd has been commissioned by the Archbishops' Council of the Church of England to survey and map every churchyard in England. The project includes photographs of every headstone and memorial and the scanning and indexing of the parish records – baptisms, marriage and burials.

Already underway in the Dioceses of Carlisle and Truro we will progress systematically, diocese by diocese, across the country. As each diocese is completed it will be made available online via the Church of England's Church Heritage Record. Each church will have secure access to view and update their own churchyard map and records.

The first two dioceses to be surveyed are Cumbria and Truro, with the teams then moving south and north respectively to meet somewhere around the middle. No date was given for Hereford, but as we are around the middle maybe we will be towards the end of the 7-year programme.

The technology being used is spectacular – a back-pack of high-resolution cameras which capture everything in the churchyard – vegetation, trees, memorial stones, inscriptions, everything – and their GPS reference, as the surveyor walks the area. I have to confess to have smiled at the video shown of said surveyor walking serenely between serried ranks of uniform stones on a flat piece of land – as per the picture bottom left, for which apologies – it is a screenshot from the webinar.

The survey will also include memorials inside the churches, and the registers themselves, so that memorials can be ______ linked to the location and to the register entry.



The audience reception was mixed, inevitably given the wide range of interests represented. Whilst the benefits were readily recognised and generally warmly welcomed, the historians were to a degree saddened by the inevitable degradation of the skills and pleasures of their approach. But that has already happened as records have moved online in the last 30 years. As a result, the hobbies have become accessible to millions of people and the original records are protected whilst the information itself is out there for all of us. No doubt the same will be true this time – but with other enormous benefits for the whole fabric of our environment.

Stottesdon News

Clare Tibbits writes:

Help keep bell ringing alive in Stottesdon.

For the best part of 500 years the bells at St Marys Church, Stottesdon, have rung out to mark not only the passing hours and services at the church but also the great events of the nation, such as the funeral of the late Queen and the coronation of King Charles III.

All four bells were recast in 1750 and in 2004 three of the four bells were further restored. However, the fourth bell, the treble bell, is now in such poor condition that it needs restoration as does part of the frame used to support what is now known as a Heritage peal.

ringing it needs £15,000 to restore and renovate the peal to a safe and usable condition.

Unlike many local churches the Stottesdon Heritage peal, under tower captain Derek

Overton, has an enthusiastic band of ringers keeping the tradition of bell ringing alive. But in order to keep the bells
