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Editorial

Here we are in February and everyone is saying 'Where did January go?' Certainly the weeks seem to fly by. But it's good to be back getting WN ready for everyone again, seeing the pictures of Christmas and looking forward to the year to come.

During January there were several events which continued as part of the traditions of clubs and associations, one in particular was the tractor runs across Shropshire which brought tractors of all shapes, sizes and ages out on some cold winter's days but enjoyed by their owners and the people who saw them passing through the villages. These remind us that life continues on the farms and brought to mind a tradition which is no longer celebrated formally in most places except Dorset, Norfolk, Exeter and Chichester, namely Plough Sunday!

Plough Sunday is a traditional English celebration of the beginning of the agricultural year that has seen some revival over recent years. Plough Sunday celebrations usually involve bringing a ploughshare into a church with prayers for the blessing of the land. It is traditionally held on the Sunday after Epiphany. Accordingly, work in the fields did not begin until the day after Plough Sunday! This has changed over the centuries. However, it is another aspect which can be overlooked – the vital role of agriculture in sustaining communities – a key part of the economy in the Church of England's most rural diocese.

A reminder that Shrove Tuesday is on the 13th February when pancakes are a tradition to be enjoyed prior to Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent.

It's good to see community events starting up again – especially the Knit and Natters and Coffee Mornings at the various churches. If you're at a loose end, why not give these a try, meet different people, discover new possibilities.....?



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Dear Friends,

Ash Wednesday this year will fall on the 14th February which of course is also St Valentine's day! Ash Wednesday is traditionally the beginning of Lent, and this has been marked over the years as a period of self-discipline, fasting and spiritual journeying. It is a period of penitence and self-examination and seeing ourselves from God's perspective. Even if we don't have a strong faith, we have learnt through the work of Educational Neuroscientists that intentional self-reflection helps us to learn and enhances how we apply, transfer, retain and recall new ideas and information.

The bible recognises that as we go through life we will be tempted and tested and that our response to those times will help to shape the depth of our spiritual lives. I am often astounded by the way many Christians have been shaped by sermons and theology that promise good things but never talk about the cost of following Jesus. The writer and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer called this a theology of cheap grace.

"Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession, absolution without personal confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate."

Lent gives us an opportunity to realign our lives with God's values, it gives us a prolonged and focussed time to reflect and pray and to read the bible and deepen our faith. The 40-day period is time enough to build in new habits and actions into our lives, which will have a lasting effect.

With ongoing war in Ukraine, the conflict between Israel & Hamas and so much uncertainty in our world I am finding that there is a great deal of anxiety in society about the future and a sense of aimlessness and general anger and tiredness. Lent gives us as Christians an opportunity to give these feelings back to God and to ask him to heal and restore us. It is also, as Paul reminds us, a time to recognise that our human experiences are common and that whilst heightened by the personal challenges or world events, are not unique to us but the difference is that our faith will endure.

"No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to all. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it."

1 Corinthians 10:13

As Christians, whilst we can use this time for reflection, we also know how the story ends and we have an enduring hope within us because Jesus has conquered death and brought forgiveness to us. We are forever Easter people who live in the light of the resurrection and we can mark Lent because of his sacrifice for us. The rhythm of the spiritual and liturgical year is a helpful tool to remind us that there is a cost and a purpose to our faith, which is not about self-benefit and self-fulfilment but about generosity, servant heartedness and a simple humbler faith. As Christians, we have a message of hope for a better future and Lent gives us the perfect opportunity to prepare our hearts and minds to share the good news.

The Archbishop of Canterbury visited churches in Hereford Diocese on Saturday 9 December as part of the Year of Prayer.

The Archbishop's visit has included an opportunity to meet local people, share his passion for regular prayer, participate in prayer-walking across the city centre and join in the weekly prayers for peace at Hereford Cathedral. Prayers for peace, which is a weekly event, is usually attended by a small group led by the Dean, The Very Revd Sarah Brown. Today, numbers swelled to a congregation of nearly 200 who came to join in the prayers at which, Sasha, a young Ukrainian girl who is living and studying in the city, read a poem she wrote for peace.

The Archbishop is encouraging Christians to pray as he explains: "it's the most fundamental thing I can do in my job as leader of the Anglican Church." Speaking following prayers for peace, he explains that in the beautiful cathedral surroundings: "you could genuinely sense people's desire for peace in our world." In an earlier conversation at St Peter's Church in the city centre with The Bishop, the two senior church leaders discussed the challenge of finding time and space to pray every day. The Archbishop also shared how when he prays for peace it is not just about seeking a solution to global conflicts but is also finding peace in everyday relationships with each other.

He sums up:

Today has been hearing about further progress on the new city University which I visited in 2019 as well as learning about growth in some of the tiny rural churches which make up Hereford Diocese. I'm here to encourage others to pray and in doing so, I hope they will find the faithful God who through Jesus Christ comes close to us."

We're pleased to bring you, on the next page, their Christmas Newsletter from the mission field in Gulu, Northern Uganda.

Dear Friends

It is the season for Christmas letters, so we bring you our round up of the month's news. Thank you for sending news to us, it is always good to hear from you.

It is Sunday today, and the builders are working hard on the chapel. They are eager to finish now, and go home for Christmas. Whilst they are working here they have been sleeping in one of the classrooms, and home comforts beckon strongly. The chapel roof is now on – blue iron sheets, matching the library, and the walls are plastered outside and in; the doors and windows are in place, and it seems dry enough to think about painting and finishing. The workers have been hard working and always glad to show us the latest development. Watching them work as a team to get the A frames of the roof in place was very exciting, but just has skilled has been their putting in the ceiling and plastering, all without any motorized tools.



In the college Stephen, the mason who is also a student, has completed the piggery, and we now have seven piglets, with the promise of three more. They are looked after by Morris who comes three times a day to feed and water them. I take down some sweet potato vines, or cabbage leaves in the morning to supplement their maize bran diet. (Maize bran is the rough grindings when the maize itself is ground for flour for the students food. It is good food for pigs, and for chickens).

Simon has enjoyed working with colleagues in the Diocese to plan the Rooted in Jesus conference which will be held in Gulu Primary School just up the road, at the end of January. The books have gone to

the printers and the proofs are now corrected. Do pray that the right people come from each church in the Diocese so that the course can be initiated successfully.

We don't yet quite know what we will be doing for Christmas, but as the cob oven is now finished and, after three attempts, we have actually made a passable pizza, and some nice bread, I am sure that Christmas dinner will involve pizza rather than turkey, and cake rather than pudding. One way or another we will, in this culture that is strange to us, celebrate the one who left the glories of heaven for the difficulties and strangeness of life in Bethlehem, Egypt and Nazareth. We give thanks that the Word of life, which spoke all creation into being became silenced in his mother's womb, and learnt language from those around him. We wonder at the love of one who became a refugee in the world which he had made and gave us hope for home coming at the end of all time.



We have enjoyed three weddings on campus this month, which should help the college generate funds, if only there weren't so many repairs after the event. On December 28th the college is host to the wedding of Ivan and Niccole. Ivan is the artist who has made two pictures of Jesus for the chapel so far, and has become a close acquaintance over the last few months. We have enjoyed getting to know them both as they plan for their future, and look forward to celebrating the great day with them and all the guests.

The students return from January 4th and will see significant developments to the college. We hope and pray that during the course of this term the registration application which we have now handed in to the National Council for Higher Education will be processed. Please pray for us as we make the necessary upgrades to the college buildings, like putting doors on the toilets and bathing areas. Pray for us as we inaugurate the new chapel, and adapt the former chapel back to a classroom. We will need new chairs and tables for that space and all the internal furnishing for the chapel. Pray for the Rooted in Jesus conference to run smoothly, and that the course may be an effective tool for discipleship in the Diocese. Pray too for the planning and execution of the Diocesan Convention planned for January 22nd – 26th.

As I conclude this we have just been sent an answer to prayer: enough funds to bring the buildings up to scratch. I hardly dared ask for these funds for very mundane purposes, yet God has provided. I am so very grateful.

We pray for you a blessed and joyful Christmas, and a blessed New Year. Love and blessings from Sarah and Simon.



Saint of the Month Polycarp Bishop of Smyrna c69AD - c155AD

Polycarp was one of the Apostolic Fathers and was a bishop in the early church in a place called Smyrna which is in Turkey close to the Aegean Sea in former Asia Minor.



He was one of the earliest church leaders and continued the work of the early apostles, in particular John whom he had known personally, in spreading the gospel.

His faith was unshakeable at a time that the early church was being persecuted for its beliefs.

In one of his letters, he states:

"Eighty-six years I have served him (Jesus), and he never did me any injury. How then can I blaspheme my King and my Saviour?"

It was said by contemporary writers that when men came to arrest him,

"he did not hesitate, but immediately gave orders that a table should be spread for them. Then he invited them to partake of a bounteous meal, and asked of them one hour that he might pray undisturbed. And when they had given permission, he stood up and prayed, being full of the grace of the Lord, so that those who were present and heard him praying were amazed, and many of them now repented that such a venerable and godly old man was about to be put to death."

He refused to recant his faith in Jesus Christ and he was sentenced to death by being burned alive. He would not be nailed to the funeral pile, he told his executioners that his Saviour would give him strength to remain in the fire. So, they merely bound him with rope.

It was said that as he burned in the flames, he appeared not as flesh which is burnt, but as bread that is baked, or as gold and silver glowing in a furnace. Ultimately Polycarp was not killed by the fire but was put to death with a dagger.

Whilst our faith may not lead us in the martyrdom of Polycarp it is a reminder that remaining faithful and trusting even through difficult times is key to who we are.

We sometimes think of these martyrs as great, heroic figures. They were tremendous, courageous people. But there was also substance in their courage and faith a combination of sacrifice and joy. These were the seeds of the early church and the same combination that will also bring its growth in the future.

A major project for the Group's committee this year is the refurbishment of the History Centre interior. Group Chairman Paul Wilson explained "This will include, a complete redesign of the wall displays, grouping them in three key sections that have helped define the history of Ditton Priors, as depicted in our new logo; namely the hill, the church and agriculture." Paul added "It's a 12-month project and we'll have to phase it as available funds allow, but it will be a big step forward in helping attract visitors to the centre."


Thank you to all of you who support us from other areas at our services. It is lovely to have you and a chat after the service.

The first service in January also had an increased congregation, led by Revd Joe. Many thanks to Ragni for providing the guitar music.



Molecules of the month - Drugs created by Artificial Intelligence

I am particularly fascinated by proteins, the big molecules the form most of our cells and which are mainly responsible for making them living structures. I have spent all its working life looking at proteins and chemicals that interact with them and I share this obsession with the drug industry, the source of most of the pills we take to treat illness. Whilst proteins may be endlessly fascinating, they are also endlessly complicated, which makes trying to understand them hard.

Proteins are made of building blocks called amino acids. There are twenty of these and typically several hundred of these will be joined together in a precise way to form a distinct protein. Since the late 1970s we have had the technology to work out the order in which these amino acids join together; this is called the sequence of the protein. Unfortunately, that does not help very much in trying to understand how proteins work and how their function can be changed by drugs. A chain of 100 or more amino acids will fold to form a unique shape; this is known as its structure and is what makes the protein functional and allows drugs to bind it. If the protein loses it structure, by for example, heating, it is said to be denatured because it has lost its essential nature (as an aside, cookery is largely the art of denaturing proteins making them easier for us to eat). Trying to work out the structure of a protein is a demanding task; it is much easier than it used to be, but it still is a significant undertaking. We now know the sequence of most proteins in the human body, but we do not have experimentally-defined structures for the vast majority of these.

Back in 2021 there was a major breakthrough. For the first time a computer programme became available that was very good at predicting the structure of proteins. This was called Alphafold. It has been used to predict the structure of every protein in the human body and most of these predictions are likely to be pretty accurate. It is easy to use; I have managed to use it to predict the structure of a number of proteins I am interested in that are found in fish and I believe the results.

In principle, once the structure of a protein is available, it should be straightforward for chemists to predict how drugs could bind to the protein molecule. Computer-aided drug design has been around for two or more decades and recently has had some notable successes. Whilst most drug companies will have perhaps several 100,000 chemicals in what they call "libraries", these are only a fraction of possible drugs; making and testing all of these would be impossible.

Companies have now started to use computers to design a far wider range of potential drugs and then see how well they interact with all the new protein structures that are available. In August, a company called Recursion reported how they had screened 36 billion potential drug structures against 15,000 predicted protein structures and identified 2.8 quadrillion interactions. (a quadrillion is 1 with fifteen zeros after it). So is it party time for drug discovery, perhaps using some newly discovered happy pills?

Not quite. The overwhelming number of interactions predicted by Recursion are just that; computer predictions and not tested in a laboratory. Experience suggests that a lot of these will be false positives. A particular weakness is that proteins and drugs are flexible; as they interact with each other, they change their shape. It is not clear how Recursion have not dealt with this. My colleague at Aston University, Dr John Simms is working on this problem, as are numerous other scientists, but we still have some way to go.

So we have not yet eliminated the need for bench scientists testing drugs. But let us not be too negative; the world is moving fast and my guess is that within a few years, our computer predictions of drug binding to proteins will be as good as are our predictions of protein structure. We are living through a revolution in drug discovery.



St Mary's Heritage Project

Further research by our Archaeologist, George Nash, using photographic techniques pioneered by NASA, has turned up evidence of early wall paintings in the Chancel - these images, other 'finds' and yet another explanation of the early Medieval 'Tympanum' [as featured in The Shropshire Star] are likely to be available for display in the new Heritage Interpretation area under the Tower - from later on this Spring.

Although February usually feels far from spring, it is the month when rooks usually start to build their nests, although sometimes they start in January. Many churchyards contain rookeries, situated within tall deciduous trees and a great deal of fun can be had in watching the antics of the rooks. Rooks make their nests from small branches and twigs and can be seen flying in with suitable material but also pinching particularly nice ones from the neighbours! A winter storm can seriously disrupt this nest building activity and send them back to the beginning with a great deal of chatter and fuss.

Rookeries may contain a few nests or sometimes up to a thousand and, once established, a rookery may last for centuries in the same location. Rooks are sociable and as well as nesting together they often feed in groups, eating a wide variety of foods including invertebrates pulled from the soil by their large, strong beaks. They will also eat fruit, seeds, acorns and grain and can visit garden bird feeders, taking hold of them with their feet rather like a parrot. Mixed flocks of rooks and jackdaws can be seen flying around, calling prior to going to roost. The collective nouns for a group of rooks are a parliament, congregation or clamour!

Rooks and crows can appear quite similar until you look and listen closely. A rook has a domed forehead and greyish face, its leg feathers give it 'baggy trousers'. Crows are sleeker, tend to nest singly and are often seen in twos or threes but rarely in larger flocks. Both birds have a cawing call, but crows have a harsher note and tend to repeat the call three times, whilst rooks use a wider variety of sounds and pitches including some clicks and wheezing sounds. Rooks and crows belong the to Corvid family which also includes ravens, jays, magpies and choughs. Take a look at the Caring for God's Acre website for a Spotter's Guide to Corvids HERE.
