March Newsletter from the Bishop of Hereford



Dear Friends,

I have just read the Rule of St. Benedict, to my shame for the first time.

It is a monastic rule from the 6th century that sets out the disciplines and structures for the effective running of a monastery. The rules of poverty, chastity and obedience are highly restrictive; the punishments for violations severe; the lifestyle highly demanding. Praying at set offices eight times a day (including at 2 in the morning) meant that the monk would rarely get more than few hours of unbroken sleep. Central heating was for wimps and the diet uninspiring. Although eased in later centuries, it has been the basis for the monastic tradition in Western Europe ever since. It is not the sort of discipline that works in everyday life, but that doesn't mean it has no value. It is designed to foster Christian virtues of humility, and obedience (albeit expressed through submission to the Abbot), and a growing Christlikeness.

Most of March will be the season of Lent, when we Christians have traditionally given up things that give us pleasure to focus on our spiritual journey. As our world has changed it seems increasingly anachronistic. Our culture screams at us from the lifestyle sections that the way to real fulfilment is getting what you really desire. The idea that giving something up might be good for you, other than as a grudging acknowledgement of post-Christmas weight gain, is anathema. Consumerism works by creating desire and then offering to fulfil it.

But our strongest desires are not necessarily our deepest ones. Giving things up, or fasting, can get us in touch with these deeper desires that only God can satisfy. There is evidence that restricting calories by intermittent fasting or turning our mobiles off is actually good for us physically and psychologically. A good lent can be like leaving the Christmas presents unopened under the tree until Christmas day. There is a joy in the opening that is enhanced by the waiting.

So, as well as helping us grow closer to God, our Lenten restraint can amplify the joy of Christ risen when we get to that glorious Easter celebration. I once gave up tea and coffee for lent and had my first large cup on Easter morning. Before I knew it, I'd done three services and built a compost heap! Lent can be spiritual dynamite.

Saint of the Month -

St David, Bishop of Menevia, Patron Saint of Wales

aint David (Welsh: Dewi Sant) was the Welsh Bishop of Menevia during the 6th century. Later after his death *he became regarded as a saint, becoming the patron saint of Wales.*

His life is celebrated on the 1st March. The earliest records of his life were written by Rhygyvarch, son of Julien bishop of St David's c.1090. His claim was that the history of Saint David was found in cathedral archives, although historians now believed that his motives were to further independence of the Welsh church, which had refused the Roman rite and now sought an independent status equal to that of Canterbury.

David was known as a renowned preacher and teacher and founded monastic settlements and churches in Wales, Dumnonia (present day Cornwall) and Brittany. St David's cathedral stands on the site of the monastery he founded in the Glyn Rhosyn valley of Pembrokeshire. Having visited this cathedral myself on many occasions, whilst staying on retreat just down the road at Saint Non's, on the coast, it is a truly beautiful and spiritual place, well worth a visit, especially if you arrive for evensong. One interesting feature of the building is the slope of the floor from east to west, it drops by some 14 feet!

Saint David is well-known for one particular miracle which took place at Llanddewi Brefi. It is said that whilst he was preaching the ground upon which he stood is reputed to have risen to form a small hill. A white dove, which became his emblem, settled on his shoulder. He is depicted wearing episcopal vestments standing on a mound with a dove at his shoulder.

The monastic rule of David was a simple one, monks had to pull the plough without the assistance of animals, drink only water and eat only bread with salt and herbs, spend evenings in prayer reading and writing. He was against personal possessions living a simple and ascetic life. The symbol of the leek has its genesis with St David's or more accurately, ascribed to St David referred to by Shakespeare in Henry V.

When he died it was said that the monastery was filled with angels as Christ received his soul, his last words translated from Welsh to English:

"be joyful, keep your faith and creed, and do the little things that you have seen me do and heard about. I will walk the path that our fathers have trod before us".

He was laid to rest at St David's cathedral which has become a place of pilgrimage over many centuries.

His life of simplicity and self-denial bring focus to all of us on where we should place our priorities. A monastic life may not be the result but allowing time and space to pray and giving back to God our lives is what we seek to achieve in our Lenten journey and a pattern for living thereafter.

As we approach Easter and remember the greatest sacrifice of all may we live in the life of our risen saviour Jesus and serve him and those around us by doing the little things well.

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Lent Reflection

Do you ever feel that life is one big race and that each day is a cycle of trying to solve a myriad of different problems and issues? It is so easy for life to become so driven on resolving everything that we end up by resolving nothing. Lent is a time for us to reflect and to take stock to look up instead of down.

When Jesus was preaching the Sermon on The Mount he says to the crowd gathered around him:

"So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today."

This comes just after Jesus gives us the reassurance that we have a Father who knows what we need and will take care of our welfare. I am sure sometimes we may wonder when, but that is where allowing ourselves to be free for a while to focus on growing closer to him can be a real source of comfort.

Our issues and challenges have been common for years we only need to look back at the hardship and trials that our forebears have endured to know that this is the case. Faith does not downplay any of these trials, rather it offers us the real and tangible strength, support and love of a God that faces them with us. Jesus tries to bring a sense of perspective and ask us to look at what is in front of us in the context of a God that knows what we need.

So, this Lent, I would urge you to slow down and simply allow yourself to **be**, to focus on one task at a time and to trust God to be what he has always been, consistent and faithful. Focus on what truly satisfies, on what God provides, and our troubles will seem less daunting.

Victor Hugo said:

'Have courage for the great sorrows of life, and patience for the small ones. And when you have laboriously accomplished your daily task, go to sleep in peace. God is awake.'



Why sing??

Revd David Poyner offers this insight into the effects and benefits of singing!

One Sunday, the vicar, Pat Brock, preached on the valley of the dry bones; the prophet Ezekiel has a vision of a valley full of scattered human bones that miraculously come together to become again living people. Pat was a marvellous preacher and he finished his vivid description of this with a detail of his own; "I know, that once it had happened, there would be singing".

Pat was drawing on his own experience as a soldier in the "Desert Rats", the 8th Army that fought in North Africa in the Second World War. He had been in the great battles, for four days he had been adrift in boat, escaping the advancing German army. Pat knew how people respond to crisis, death and danger.

Singing is an important part of that; it releases emotions, binds us to others. Through the music, it communicates in ways that spoken words alone cannot, it connects those singing. There is no such thing as a person who cannot sing; some may be better able to hold a tune than others, but we all can make our own music when we open our mouths and that is precious.

We sing hymns in church for a reason. There have been many services where the only thing that has spoken to me has been the hymns. We of course, do not need to go to church to sing; just go to a football match to see the power of singing. And in church, we do not restrict singing to services. Some churches host community choirs, where people can sing all kinds of music, simply for the joy of singing.

In our local churches, we have the **Daddy's Hat** events. From Spring to Autumn, usually on the third Saturday of the month, for an hour from 3pm, local musicians will come to one of our churches to perform. They do so for the joy of making music. And at all those events, we sing together; it may be a hymn, something from Leonard Cohen or the sounds of sixties; it has even been "Just one cornetto". It really does matter. It uplifts all of us who take part. Just sing.

Daddy's Hat returns!

Molecule of the month - GDF15

hormone is a chemical messenger that allows one part of the body to communicate with another. It is a chemical that is transported in the blood. We have known about hormones since the 19th century and most people will be familiar with examples such as insulin. However, new hormones are still being discovered and new functions of old hormones are being uncovered.



One of the most recent hormones to be discovered is known as GDF15. As this stands for growth differentiation factor 15, you may understand why it is usually abbreviated. GDF15 is produced in many places in the body and often just has actions close to where it is made. Technically when this happens is acting as a type of messenger called an autocoid, rather than a hormone which acts some distance from its site of production. It seems to be a protective factor that helps the body to fight infection. However, in some situations it does act as a hormone; it can

activate cells in the brain to reduce food intake and body weight.

GDF15 is unusual it can be produced by the growing foetus in the womb and it sends signals to the pregnant mother to ensure her body acts to nurture the foetus. It is an important player in pregnancy, to ensure that at the end, a healthy baby is born. Of course, one of the common features in pregnancy is sickness; around



two thirds of mothers will experience this. Normally this is mild, but in something like 1% of pregnancies a condition called hyperemesis gravidarum (HG) develops, where the vomiting is severe and can result in hospitalisation. New research has linked this to GDF15. It seems that women who suffer from severe vomiting normally have low levels of GDF15 prior to pregnancy. When the foetus starts producing GDF15, the cells in the brain that respond to this are very sensitive to the hormone and become over-activated. By contrast, those women who had higher levels of GDF15 before pregnancy will have adapted to the hormone and will not respond in such a drastic way to a further elevation. There is some evidence that in women who develop serious hyperemesis gravidarum, the foetuses may be genetically programmed to produce large amounts of GDF15.

The research opens new ways to treat severe vomiting in pregnancy, perhaps by adding drugs that will stop GDF15 from acting. We would need to be sure that these agents did not leave women more vulnerable to infection, as that is one of the main functions of GDF15. This is likely to be explored in further research.



BCMP Community Group Public Update - January 2024

The BCMP Community Group Committee would like to wish all the patients of the Brown Clee Medical Practice a Happy, Healthy and Prosperous 2024. We would like to especially like to thank all those patients who came to the various Roadshows. Your participation and feedback has made an invaluable contribution to the initiative.

We're delighted to see there is clearly a great deal of support for the path the Group is taking. The review of the comments received at the Roadshows indicates almost 90% of attendees were "very happy" with the approach being taken.

A similar number supported the features proposed for the new "incorporated" Community Benefit Society (CBS) needed to own the premises. The CBS model meets the criteria of being community-owned, for community benefit and not-for-profit, while being able to issue community shares and, if so decided, to have charitable status.

There was a great deal of interest in being able to invest in 'community shares' as well as to make donations or loans. The indications people gave on the forms they completed at the end of the roadshow about the extent of financial support they would be willing to provide gives us real confidence that, together with grants obtainable to support community investment, we will be able to raise the sums of money necessary to purchase the premises and equip them for the future.

One final piece of feedback received from some of those attending the Roadshows suggests there is sometimes confusion between the roles of the BCMP Community Group and the Brown Clee Medical Practice Patient Group (PPG), currently chaired by Tina Ranson. Both groups recognise this and may issue a joint statement in early 2024 to further add clarity. However, our new Community Benefit Society will have a new name and will supersede the BCMP Community Group and this should help in differentiating the activities going forward.

The Community Group will be soon at the stage where it requires funds so that it can meet the fees associated with the forming of a legal entity. In the first instance we have requested a small grant from each of the Parish Councils within the surgery catchment area. If this request does not raise the required amounts then we will look to organising some fund raising events in the spring.

The BCMP Community Group will be holding an event, provisionally 9th June 2024 and will be at Pam's Pools in Underton. Pam Yuille has kindly offered the venue for the event and we thank her for her generosity. The date will be confirmed early next year. In addition it is hoped that there will be an "open garden" event kindly hosted by Bob Browning in July 2024.

A small group of patients from Ditton Priors have suggested an event to raise awareness of the initiative by organising a "Climb Everest" walk to the top of Brown Clee. The idea being that if the required number of people participate it would be the equivalent of climbing Everest. The Group wholly supports this and we look forward to this event in the autumn of 2024.

The next milestone of registering the incorporated legal entity, CBS, should conclude during the first quarter of this year and this will be announced once completed. Many thanks for your continued interest and support.

Caring for God's Acre - the song of the Mistle Thrush

March is a great month to search for and listen to mistle thrushes. They start to breed in February and by March can be heard proclaiming from the tops of tall trees. Unlike other thrushes such as song thrush or blackbird, mistle thrushes are known for singing during stormy weather, hence the name storm cock. They are also called Throstles, an old word for thrush. By perching high to sing, they amplify their already loud song which can be heard up to 2km away. Compared to other thrushes the mistle thrushes' song is more monotonous and piercing but still a joyful sound to hear and a herald of spring. You can identify the three thrushes by their song and, once you have learned the difference, they are quite easy to separate. Have a listen on the RSPB website as a starting point.

Mistle thrushes favour parkland conditions with big trees and grassland, where they feed on a wide variety of invertebrates. Churchyards and cemeteries can be perfect for them having mature soils full of invertebrates, few or no pesticides and mature trees for perching and nesting. Many burial grounds contain evergreen trees which were planted during the nineteenth century, these are now mature and offer excellent habitat for thrushes as well as other birds and animals.

Mistle thrushes are currently in decline in the UK and churchyards and cemeteries may be important strongholds for them. We would love to know how many churchyards have mistle thrushes breeding in them, and if you hear one singing, this will be a male who is proclaiming his territory so a good indicator of breeding. Please let Caring for God's Acre know by making a record on iNaturalist, you can do this by recording the song or taking a photo of the bird. Alternatively, you can email wildlife@cfga.org.uk.

Bishop Richard in the House of Lords

The new Lord Bishop of Hereford made his maiden speech in the House of Lords on 22nd February 2024.

"Hereford is the smallest and most rural diocese in England. We comprise the counties of Herefordshire and the southern half of Shropshire, one parish in Worcestershire and 14 in Wales. Sustaining a diocesan infrastructure with such a small base presents its challenges. For every 800 people who live here, we have one church building, and three-quarters of them are grade 1 listed.

I am grateful to be the Bishop of Hereford, not least because of my

agricultural interests. My first degree was in agriculture and forest sciences, followed by a master's in soil and water engineering. Prior to ordination, I spent a number of happy years as an agronomist, advising farming clients in the south of England. I also married into a farming family, so the success of the agricultural sector and the health of the rural economy is a particular interest. I am probably the only Bishop on this Bench who can tell you both how to grow an excellent wheat crop and how to build a ventilated improved pit latrine.

Rural poverty is often hidden and can be affected by a wide variety of policy areas. It can also be concealed by statistics. Average income figures for the county of Herefordshire are unremarkable; however, they conceal a huge gulf between the wealthiest and the rest. Recent statistics show that 60% of the population were earning £1,000 a month or less. One-third of 18-year-olds leave the county never to return. There are few opportunities for a well-paid career locally.

The agricultural sector in my diocese is innovative and pioneering, and is one of our largest employers, both directly and in its support industries. However, smaller farmers are struggling. The transition from basic farm payment support to environmental land management schemes post Brexit, while welcome in many of its aims, has not been seamless. The gap in funding, particularly that which occurred at the transition last summer, added to the stress. Access to these schemes is more difficult for tenant and upland farms, in particular. Suicides in the farming community in my area approach one per month despite the best efforts of local charities such as We are Farming Minds. This regular tragedy reminds us of the importance of personal welfare, which includes the certainty that we all need in order to plan for the future. It is essential for farmers, and essential for the rest of us as they seek to run viable and profitable businesses which produce food for all of us. This is a public good.

Competitiveness must be a level playing field. For example, the UK-Australia free trade deal, the first agreed under the UK's independent trade policy, opens up UK agricultural markets for Australian produce, regardless of whether or not it is produced to the same standards that are required by law of UK farmers. Henry Dimbleby, who led the Government's national food strategy, said that a failure to adopt a "core standards" approach to animal welfare and the environment in our pursuit of free trade deals risks "exporting the cruelty and the carbon emissions abroad". I urge the Government to be mindful of these risks in future trade deals.

I hope I may have opportunity to speak in debates on these issues in the future. Poverty is an issue that affects all communities, but in rural areas it runs the risk of being neglected in policy because of a smaller, more dispersed population. I look forward to being a voice in your Lordships' House for the people of the diocese of Hereford and the thriving of our rural communities."
