

Dear Friends,

May marks the end of the Easter season and the beginning of what is affectionately known as 'ordinary time' in the Church calendar. The pivot happens at the feast of Pentecost on May 19th this year. Every Sunday is always a celebration of the resurrection, so its hard to see what is ordinary about it. The events of the Christ's death and resurrection are the turning point of history. It is a world-shattering event that means life can never be the same again. The book of Acts tells us how the disciples' lives were turned upside down by it. In their grief at the loss of Jesus a number were considering returning to their previous occupations. Once they encountered the risen Lord, they decided to change the world instead!

However, it was not just historical events which changed things. It was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Christian faith has always been a supernatural one. In the struggles to fill rotas, find volunteers, maintain buildings and serve our communities we can easily forget this. If the Christian life was just a set of rules to obey, religious acts to observe and an institution to maintain, it would not have lasted very long.

Trusting in the Holy Spirit to empower and lead is less safe than seeking to control events ourselves. Periodically in the history of the Church the Holy Spirit has broken through in ways that have upended our conventional way of doing things. It happened in the Wesleyan revival of the 18th century, numerous mini revivals in the church (of which some happened in our diocese) and in the great outpouring in Azusa Street in 1906 that gave birth to Pentecostalism. This is now the third largest stream in the Church today. In many ways it is hard to see how our current institutional predicament can be served by strategic thinking alone. I am praying for another (likely messy!) outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Diocese of Hereford. Only the Holy Spirit can give us the courage we need for the evangelistic challenge. Only the Holy Spirit can turn the hearts of those currently indifferent to Christian things to help see their need for the Lord. So, 'Come Holy Spirit and kindle the hearts of your people with the fire of your love'. Today, we need that more than ever.

Saint of the Month St Matthias the Apostle - died c AD 80

Not much is known of the apostle Matthias, he was not amongst the original 12 disciples chosen by Jesus but replaced Judas Iscariot after his betrayal. Even though he is overlooked it would be wrong to assume that he did not have a part to play in the shaping of the early church.

We know from our reading of the Acts of the Apostles (Ch 1. 20-26), that he was selected by lot, amongst the apostles. It is made clear during the selection by Peter, that the one chosen should be part of the group who had been with Jesus throughout his ministry, from the baptism by John through to the time of his resurrection. The choice made by the apostles was Matthias.

Matthias loved Christ and followed his many journeys, witnessing miracles, and it was likely that he was one of those disciples appointed to go out to do the work of the Lord, referred to in Luke's gospel (Ch 10).

It is believed that after Pentecost, supported by various sources, that Matthias took the Gospel first to the Jews in Judea and then to the Gentiles in Ethiopia and Macedonia. Little is known of his work, however we do know that he returned to Jerusalem where he was stoned to death and beheaded, although there is conjecture that he may have died in old age.

Whatever the truth about his ultimate demise, I like the encouragement offered by Matthias. One of the early disciples selected by Jesus, but not the core group of the 12 but subsequently recognised by his peers due to his faithfulness and dedication to serve the Lord, a dedication that brought him within that core group.

Being Christ's disciples today means often not being recognised or praised, but quietly serving God, knowing that the lord knows our hearts. Matthias was recognised by his peers for his Christ like devotion to the Gospel, may we also be seen in that light.



It was also great to welcome 11 new members who took the opportunity to join the History Group on the night, as well as those who renewed their memberships. More detail about the formal part of the

meeting below.



In addition to the formalities of the AGM itself (summary below) there was a fascinating photographic slideshow entitled 'Ditton Now & Then', put together by John Coles and presented by chairman Paul Wilson, depicting scenes from around the village and the hill as they were 100 years ago, and as they are now.

A couple of the photos are shown here - the ruins of the crushing plant as it is now, taken as closely as possible from the same angle as the old photo when it was working.

Paul also talked about the success of the Group's events over the last 12 months, the next event (planned for Tuesday 28th May), History Centre open days and plans to improve the Centre's graphic displays going forward over the next year.



Summary of the formal part of the AGM:

- The Treasurer presented a healthy financial report for the year covering income from memberships, donations and grants and expenditure on events, printing and sundries.
- Nominations were received from the existing committee members, but no new nominations were received. The current committee will therefore remain in place for the coming year.


Our judge Elsie Jordan did a super job as usual of awarding prizes to our entries. Best in show was won once again by



Molecule of the month - God and the Scientist



This month, Revd David Poyner explains how he reconciles his beliefs as a Christian and his commitment to God, with his life's work as a scientist. This article is based on his talk at the Evening Service at St Mary's Church Billingsley on Sunday 14th April.

For those who don't know, my main job is Professsor of Pharmacology at Aston University, where I teach and carry out research into how drugs work. All my adult life I have been fascinated by how cells communicate with each other, specifically trying to understand this at a molecular level. For the last 35 years I have worked on a molecule called calcitonin gene-related peptide, CGRP. It is found in nerve cells and it is probably best thought of as a natural protectant released when the body is under stress. It causes blood vessels to expand, the heart to beat faster, it makes nerves more sensitive to pain and it causes inflammation, which is actually how the body fights disease. Sometimes of course this can go wrong; anyone here ever had a migraine? Then you have met CGRP. I've published 150 scientific papers but to be honest, I don't think I've ever discovered anything memorable. But that is the lot of most scientists; science is a collective endeavour and usually it builds on a series of very small steps to move forward. For most scientists, our legacy is not our own findings, it is the people we have helped to train; that is certainly true in my case.

The war between science and religion. Ask many about science and religion and they have a picture of Charles Darwin and his supporters running rings round Victorian bishops. Or, going back further, Galileo being tried by the church for his scientific observations. The church, historically, has often been on the wrong side of the argument. However, I have to say I've met with very little animosity. I have had some strange looks when I turn up at scientific meetings wearing a dog collar; mostly that is curiosity. One colleague said he had never met a vicar before seeing me. It is true that if you survey the scientific elite, fellows of the Royal Society for example, not many will say that they follow any particular religious faith. But I suspect that if you were to survey these people you would find they might hold a number of views that might seem a bit odd to many; the scientific elite can have a very narrow focus and their mastery of science does not extend to other branches of human endeavour. I have read The God Delusion by Richard Dawkins; I have to say the god who he does not believe in is also a god I do not think exists either; he cherry-picks the Bible to create a supernatural tyrant who sits in judgement on a trembling humanity. But for the most part, this has not been the reaction I have found amongst my fellow scientists. Some have religious faith themselves (but interestingly, I often only found this after I started wearing my clerical collar); others are atheists but they get spirituality; a close friend of mine who does not believe in God nonetheless came to my ordination and has asked me to pray for her. I really have not experienced a war between science and religion.

My faith. So let's just for a minute think what God might be like if she or he really exists. If there is a God, then God is plausibly going to be outside our world. We live in a physical world and it is governed by laws; F=ma, e=mc2 and so forth. Everything I do as a scientist relies on this; there must be a physical explanation for the results I see in my experiments and it is my job to uncover that. But God may well not be bound by these laws. In many faiths, God is seen as the creator. Now this has nothing to do with Genesis and making the world in 7 days; the priests who wrote that had no interest in science, I really doubt they thought that the world was physically made like that and they might be surprised that 2500 years later there are people who take their account literally. What we actually mean by saying that God is creator is to draw a distinction between a God who is active in our physical world, but who at the same time is not bound by it. So if that is the case, my scientific method is totally useless for telling me anything about an entity that is outside time and space. We are up against mystery and science won't work with

So really, I think you either believe or you don't, but don't expect science to contribute much one way or the other. I believe in God, because to quote the former BBC Religious Affairs correspondent, Gerald Priestland, I believe in poetry. I trust my instincts, my emotions because if God is real, that is very likely how I will experience the divine. Others may disagree, but science isn't the trump.





Daddy's Hat



Saturday 21st April - The Welsh singer Deborah Rose was suffering from severe throat problems on the day and was unable to perform at St Peter's as planned – but instead, in this very beautiful church, the audience was treated to a recital by classical guitarist Kit McCafferty and by Mary Hardham, accompanying her own singing on her guitar.

We've lost approximately 97% of flower-rich meadows since the 1930's and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators, like bees and butterflies.

A healthy lawn with some long grass and wildflowers benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and can even lock away carbon below ground.

There's often a secret to be found within a churchyard or cemetery. Slowworms may be living there, rarely seen by visitors as they tend to hide within the vegetation and don't emerge to bask in the sun like other reptiles. Slowworms are not particularly slow and they are not worms, neither are they snakes. They are actually lizards without legs and, when warmed up and active can be pretty nippy! Slowworms hunt in hidden places such as compost heaps, thick vegetation at the base of a wall or hedge and within piles of logs or stones. They catch slower moving prey like slugs and can 'drop' their tails to escape predators, a characteristic of all lizards.

May is a good time to look for them and the easiest way to do this is to put out some pieces of old roofing material, about 50cm square. You can use corrugated tin, but this can have sharp edges, onduline is better and a supplier may give you some offcuts for free. Following a conversation with those who manage the site, place a few of these squares in areas that catch the morning sun and are away from paths, perhaps in rougher vegetation such as tussocky grass. Slowworms will go under the squares to warm up in the mornings before going out to hunt and may be there at any time of day in colder weather.

Check the squares about once a week, lifting one side carefully and looking underneath. Try and check between 8:00 and 10:00am for best results as this is when the animals are warming up. You may be rewarded by a slowworm and also many other creatures such as worms, beetles or woodlice. Why not take a quick picture as the square is lifted, before too much scurries or slithers off! It may take animals a while to find the squares so be patient, having more squares gives a better chance of seeing slowworms.

Churchyards and cemeteries are havens for reptiles and also amphibians such as frogs, toads and newts and we're collecting information to better understand just how important they are for these animals. Please take a photo using the iNaturalist app or let us know what you've seen via email if you don't use iNaturalist. You can keep checking for slowworms from April or May through to September. Why not include a peep under the square as part of a Churches Count on Nature event during Love Your Burial Ground week – 8th and 16th June. All the best,
