June Newsletter from the Archdeacon of Ludlow



Dear Friends,

As I write this, I'm about to embark on a four-week period of interim study leave to complete (God willing) my PhD thesis. By the time you read it, we'll know whether or not I have succeeded!

The work focuses on one of the seven deadly sins, not necessarily the most popular of topics when the idea that human beings might be sinful creatures in need of a Saviour has rather fallen out of favour in our society. Even more obscurely, the sin I'm writing about is the one most people have never heard of: acedia. It's most often translated 'sloth' which is usually associated with laziness, and laziness isn't normally seen as much of a sin. An annoying characteristic, maybe, but not a sin.

But as I've studied this topic over many years (too many years; I've often felt like my own case study in acedia) I've come to realise it's far more complex than that, and may even be the prevailing sin of our time, all the more insidious because we've largely forgotten it even exists.

Acedia, according to the early theologians I've been reading and engaging with, is a toxic combination that occurs when desire and anger become disordered. It makes us either withdraw into inactivity or hide in restless overactivity, in an effort to avoid engaging with God, or with fellow human beings, or with the tasks God has given us to do. That's why I'm suggesting this is the hidden but very real sin of our time.

One theologian calls it the container of all other vices because it triggers other the other deadly sins. So far from sloth being almost trivial it appears it's potentially lethal for our spiritual lives, if left unchallenged.

But, thanks be to God, it needn't be. Like any other sin with which we battle acedia has been overcome by Christ on the cross. In our individual lives and struggles against sin we can know God's grace, forgiveness, and strengthening in the daily battle against the sins we know all too well and this sin of acedia, whose name we may never have heard of but now may recognise.

Recognising it is the first step in overcoming it. I love the deeply realistic means of grace which our ancient predecessors in faith suggested as prescriptions for those suffering from acedia. They were written more than 1500 years ago, but could have been written yesterday:

First, pray short prayers, not long ones. The mind can wander and fall prey to acedia when praying long prayers.

Second, set yourself a short task, and don't get up or do anything else until you've completed it.

Third, physical work. That can snap us out of an acedia attack in the mind.

Fourth, try a warm bath (yes, really!). That one's a bit less practical if acedia strikes while you're at work.

Fifth, the one that usually makes people sigh in startled relief: tears. Because tears break down the shell that acedia has built around the soul, and bring healing.

I could write a lot more on the subject, which is just as well as I have 80,000 words plus footnotes to hand in, so for now I must bid you farewell for a few weeks as I stop procrastinating and get on with the work of writing about acedia and how, by the grace of God, we may overcome it.

- 2. You can visit as few or as many churches as you wish.
- Go anywhere ... on foot, by bike, or by car, using our Sponsorship Form to collect sponsorship for your church and for the Trust.
- 4. If you can't Ride + Stride on 14th
 September then you can go on any other day
 which is what a lot of people do.

The sponsorship money is split 50/50 between your local Church and the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust (SHCT), which uses it to award grants for repairs and improvements to our Churches and Chapels. So 100% goes to our Churches.


Saint of the Month - Barnabas

An Early Apostle 1st Century AD – Patron Saint of Cyprus

Barnabas is identified in scripture as one of the very earliest followers of Jesus and was a leader in the emerging church.

He was born in Cyprus and is described in Acts 4:36-37, where he is referred to as Joseph, a Levite from Cyprus, whom the apostles called Barnabas (which means 'son of



encouragement'). He sold a field he owned and brought the money and put it at the apostles' feet." His title as a 'son of encouragement' sits well with his behaviour and actions. This simple act of sharing with others was testimony to that.

Later on in Acts Barnabas is described as a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith. It goes on to say that he brought a great many people to faith.

Barnabas was also a man that was prepared to take risks, not least of which was the response to a call guided by God to help and support the evangelist Paul. Many were dubious of Paul's conversion having persecuted many early Christians.

Barnabas followed his calling to serve the Lord initially in Antioch where a great many people became Christians – indeed it was at Antioch that the followers of Jesus were first called 'Christians'. Barnabas later decided to find Paul so the two could work together for the faith. The church grew steadily under their leadership and whilst there was disagreement at some stage over the qualities of a ministerial colleague, they can be rightly credited with a great deal of success in spreading the Gospel.

This tenacity and an ability to take calculated risks is what we can all learn from. For Christians today a desire to serve through encouragement and generosity to others, coupled with a passion to see others thrive in spreading the Gospel even at the expense of our own reputation is part of our calling. Not all are called to evangelise in this way but we are called to look for where the Holy Spirit is at work to nurture and encourage and on occasions to take risks.

While the Bible does not mention how Barnabas died, he reportedly was martyred for his faith, like some of the other apostles; he was either stoned or burned to death in Salamis, Cyprus in AD 61.

Services in Brown Clee Churches during June 2024

Brown Clee Medical Practice - Patient Participation Group

Mark Gregory writes:

An Open Meeting of the Brown Clee Medical Practice Patients' Participation Group (PPG) was held at Ditton Priors Village Hall on the evening of Tuesday 21st May, with approximately 65 members attending. Caroline John (committee member) stood in as Acting Chair for the meeting as the PPG Chair, Tina Ranson, was incapacitated due to an equestrian injury. Also in attendance were committee members Linda Jackson, Bill Lewis and Mark Gregory.

Dr Bassett gave an update on recent developments in the succession planning for the practice, most notably that Dr Wendy Matthews is now holding two consulting sessions each week at Brown Clee, with a view to making a permanent and full time move once she has had a chance to familiarise herself with the practice and the patients. Furthermore, additional recruitment of another doctor to join the Practice is actively being pursued. To provide additional support to the doctors, Dr Railton is providing a 'telephone triage' service. And Dr Bassett laid to rest any rumour that Dr Jones is soon to retire – emphatically he is not! Practice Nurse, Di Foster, gave a very informative and interesting talk about the many healthcare services provided at the Practice, especially diabetes monitoring and care, a service in which the Practice has risen over the last three years from a relatively low placing with respect to other local surgeries, to its current rating in first place in the area!

The meeting expressed its appreciation of and gratitude to Dr Bassett, Di Foster, and all of the Practice staff with rounds of applause.

Mark Gregory then presented the new constitution for the PPG, explained its role in formalising and democratising the function of the PPG and the committee, and proposed it to the meeting for ratification. The meeting approved the constitution by unanimous show of hands. Copies of the Constitution have been circulated to members and are available on request from the PPG – email address in the Local Contacts list on page 31.

The next Open Meeting of the PPG will take place at Ditton Priors Village Hall on Tuesday 23rd July this year, starting at 7:00pm. Closer to that date, communications will be sent via the usual channels requesting members to reserve places at the meeting. The AGM and the autumn Open Meeting will take place on Tuesday 29th October.

Thank you, Pat, for doing the tables and the flowers – they were just as we wanted – wild flowers are very pretty.



Surveying our local Churchyards

Sue Crichton writes:

Churchyards can be wonderful refuge places for wildlife.

They have often never had chemicals sprayed on them, areas are left uncut and with just a few mown paths through them.

The result is a rare, natural, biodiverse, habitat home to a wide variety of our native species.

A Kingdom for Wildlife is being created.

Abdon Wildlife Group has recently been and surveyed two of our local Churchyards, Cleobury North and Wheathill.

Cleobury North was a wonderful, special place.

 87 species were recorded and a second visit in July will easily record another 30.

The variety of plants there is helped by having an adjacent woodland next to it and there is damp ground there too.

WaterAvens, Wood Sedge, Lady's Smock and Golden Saxifrage were all seen

flourishing.





The old church of Wheathill in its farmyard setting, recorded 60 species. Again in the summer we hope to add another 20.

Of special note here were the Crossworts, a plant decreasing throughout Shropshire. The Goldilocks Buttercup we found is an axiophyte, an indicator of good habitat, alongside Pignut, a sign of good pasture.

What treasures they are. have a walk around and see what you can spot there too.

If you are allowing your lawns to go wild, you are helping to create these really special Kingdoms to flourish at home.

No Mow May is a UK initiative, backed by David Attenborough, to help bees and insects find nectar and pollen in our lawns.

If you can learn to love untidy, why not avoid mowing until August?

Mow alongside your borders and a mow a path through the areas you need to reach and you will be creating a wonderful texture of grasses and flowers, buzzing with life.





Molecule of the Month - Starch!!

Prof David Poyner writes:

My colleague at work, Ros, offered me an exotic sweet from one of her PhD students who had been on holiday. It was a kind of Arabic version of Turkish Delight; about the size of a Welsh Cake but thickly coated in a starch. I gratefully accepted and took a small bite, not too sure what to expect. The sweet itself was quite pleasant. Then I looked down, to discover the (ahem) zip region of my trousers were now coated in the white starch powder. I refused Ros's offer to help brush the starch away; with some rather delicate dusting I eventually managed to reduce the visual impact to something that would not get me arrested when I left the building. However, to the best of my knowledge this is the first report that starch is a biohazard.

Starch is produced by plants and is the main way they store energy. The main energygenerating chemicals in the body are sugars; molecules consisting of carbon with oxygen and hydrogen atoms joined to each other. This oxygen-hydrogen unit it called the hydroxyl group and effectively it is half a water molecule. Chemically it is reactive and so sugars both dissolve in water and also are broken down inside the body to release energy, which cells use to perform other chemical reactions. However, there is a problem with storing sugars (such as glucose or fructose). They attract water through a process called osmosis. Thus if a

tail" they form amyloid starch, but a single

glucose molecule can join two adjacent ones to form the branched amylopectin.

Plants can easily break down starch to release the glucose when they wish to produce energy. We cannot make starch, but we have some ability to break it down. Saliva in the mouth contains an enzyme called amylase, which starts the process. In the small intestine, beyond the stomach, another version of amylase is released, along with other enzymes to continue the process. Once in the large intestine, the final part of the gut, microbes can also break down what starch is left. We find it easier to

> digest the simple amyloid starch rather than amylopectin. Cooking helps us to break down starch; processed foods also typically have more starch that can be easily digested than nonprocessed foods. This may explain why eating too many processed foods can cause problems; the easy breakdown of starch can lead to too much sugar being released into the small intestine, resulting in high blood sugar.

> Starch historically has been used as a thickening agent, forming a stiff paste when mixed with water; hence the starched shirts of an earlier generation before synthetic fibres. The main industrial use of starch paste today is in paper-making. Starch is also a valuable material in

cell is full of sugars, it will draw in water which leads to numerous complications. By contrast, if the sugars are chemically joined to each other, they are less attractive to water. In humans, we join together glucose to form a substance called glycogen, which can exist harmless as granules inside our cells. Plants do the same thing, but join up the glucose molecules in different ways to form starch, which also exists as granules. If the glucose molecules are joined "nose-to-

biotechnology, both in high-technology versions but also in its traditional forms, as in malting. Barley grains are allowed to germinate in malt houses, where they convert their starch to sugar. This is then extracted with hot water and supplied to yeast to turn into alcohol in its various forms. And of course, it is used in confectionary and by evil professors to ambush unwary colleagues.

News from the Nightingale Nurse Fund

Rosemary Abbiss writes:

It is well over 20 years since our local District Nurses saw the need to start a branch of the Nightingale Nursing Fund in this area. There were once several branches in Shropshire under the umbrella of Dr Barritt at Bayston Hill Medical Practice. During recent years the other branches have all closed leaving just our local one in the Stottesdon and Cleobury Mortimer area.

How the world has changed since we started! We do not have the same role for District Nurses going into patients' homes to see the need when there were changes in patients' health that needed additional care beyond what they provided. The fund was used for paying nurses, carers and palliative care nurses in times of a medical crisis.

We, the trustees of the fund, have changed to accommodate these additional challenges. Covid, dare I mention it, has changed the world. Since then, the trustees have found the fund has not been accessed as much and therefore a

rethink was needed as we had considerable monies in the fund.

We hope that you will agree we have come to the correct conclusion:

The trustees felt that the money had been raised locally and it should

benefit the patients it was intended for. As the NNF is registered with the Charity Commission we had to follow the constitution--- which was that, on closure, the funds should go to registered nursing / caring charities.

So the decision was made to donate £20,000.00 to the Severn Hospice at Home (charity number 512394) for their work in our local community with the remaining £10,939.67 donated to "CoCo" [Cleobury Compassionate Communities] which has now registered with the Charity Commission (charity number 1206755) for their caring work in the local community.

We, the trustees, would like to say a huge thank you to all who have supported the fund and raised monies in the past. Due to confidentiality we have never been able to disclose who has benefited, but there are many grateful patients and their families who have appreciated the extra care we have been able to fund.

Kind regards to all that have been involved in the fund over the years!

Prayer Letters from Uganda-1- From Revd Sarah Cawdell

This time last year I, Sarah, was just settling into my first full semester as Principal, and now that I am starting the second full year of teaching from next week I am aware of how much I have learnt. This gives rise to a sense of vision and direction as I lead college community. Although the registration process is still the dominant drain on our energy and finances there are ways in which we can see developments in college life and begin to set a creative direction for the future.

I submitted the revised paperwork for registration last week, and look for a response at least by the end of May. All through the last month masons have been at work upgrading the dormitories, the electrician has rewired, and the painter has decorated. I attach some pictures to show the progress. The windows are no longer burglar proof, but they can be used as emergency exits (priorities change with time), each room has been divided into four rooms so that the students have a little more privacy, the ventilation has been improved, and the fresh paint and repaired beds with poles attached to hang mosquito nets mean that the place looks as good as new.

On the educational front I have been able to employ two more part time staff to help us teach the new first years who should be arriving at the start of next week, along with the returning students. This brings our staff team up to twelve either full or part time.



The addition of first years means that we have three year-groups – the full complement, and with three of the new diploma students coming from the Karamoja region in the north east, another diocese and language to add to the mix. I am sure that where we can work for unity and understanding across cultures that is part of the Holy Spirit's work and will strengthen the church.

This semester I also hope to use the Discipleship Groups on a Tuesday afternoon to explore different ways of praying with the students, and work with them to demonstrate some of the rich resources of prayer in the historical and worldwide church: using the imagination to inhabit Scripture and Lectio Divina being the most obvious examples.

In the last month Simon has been working on the development side of his portfolio, using part of a generous donation to set up some income generating agricultural projects on diocesan land. The next hope is for a poultry project, for which he is

currently writing a grant application, and the development of a farming centre on the land, so that the produce can be stored safely and effectively and someone can keep an eye on the chickens. He has really enjoyed working with the local community as they have worked with him on planting and weeding



soya, maize, sunflowers, bananas and cocoa, and these have now gone through the process of 'first weeding.' The money we have been able to pay them for this work has enabled a lot of school fees to be paid amongst other things. The work also gives inroads for relationship building and the spread of the gospel in what is a poorer area of town. Please pray for the security and fruitfulness of these crops. As the land is a bit far from the Diocesan centre it is not well guarded.

I, Sarah, have been enjoying the Bible Project podcasts as I prepare lessons on the non-Pauline epistles for my new teaching this semester. If you haven't come across these study notes and podcasts you might like to have a look at the website. It even makes Leviticus interesting!

Do keep us in touch with the work God is doing in your lives and churches, and we will continue to pray with you.

extraordinary collection of cables (health and safety?) to connect the house electricity supply to the grinding machine and the welding machine.

But the person who is cutting iron bars from the windows at college has had to go home for the day, because the generator won't stretch to that degree of power.


And the mains water is off again, and the borehole overcrowded so the women who are cleaning the dormitories of cement dust etc are using our home rainwater supply (another couple of weeks before we get the college rainwater harvesting connected up).

And part of the boundary wall has fallen down onto Rev Jane's ground nut



field, so we have to find and employ two young men to clear those bricks.

And the fallen wire had to be reported in person so David went off to do that and then



And the banana, avocado plantation has suffered in the storm,

And the pigs are undermining their food troughs, so we need to repair.

The drain for the men's bathing area seemed to have blocked again, but it was only that the users didn't know that they had to clear our new traps! Amos made easy money today!

But what I am actually doing today is writing a library collection policy, and the library users' manual.

I am so glad that I learnt juggling skills at university - though that was more entertaining somehow! Please laugh with us. We are glad to be well, and not under attack. We pray for the people of Gaza, Syria, Ukraine and South Sudan. Thank you for your love and laughter. God is faithful and keeps us in love.
