

Throughout his career as an artist David taught life drawing, watercolours, anatomy textiles and embroidery, at Ludlow Collage, Kidderminster School of Art, Hay-on-Wye Art Centre. His most powerful influence is Rembrandt. David studied his technique of painting and is now very practised. He is inspired by Rembrandts love of humanity and seeks out his own through the works of the great Master.

David lived in Selbourne, Hampshire, for many years, where he predominantly painted landscapes and wild flowers. He moved to Normandy mid 2000's, inspired by place and nature. On a recent visit to the UK he revisited Neenton where, as a young man, he spent many hours playing cricket with the late Edwin Moreton and was able to talk to members of Edwin's family and also caught up with other friends from his early painting days. We are delighted to be able to reproduce his painting of the Orchard garden at the Pheasant on one of the warmest and sunny days of this year. Thank you, David.



October Newsletter from the Archdeacon of Hereford



Dear Friends

As I write this in early September the shops are filling up with Christmas cakes and mince pies but alongside these are Halloween goods. When I was growing up Halloween was barely mentioned, and Trick or Treat was something the Americans did on Greenham Common Airbase. We had Guy Fawkes nights, with fireworks, parties and 'Penny for the Guy'. Whilst Halloween celebrations have become a feature of our culture it has become associated with spooks, ghouls and witches and things that go bump in the night! Yet it is actually a Christian festival, All Hallows' Eve - this is the traditional title for what we now call Hallowe'en.

Hallowe'en has its heart in the Old English word 'hallowed' meaning holy or sanctified. In the Christian tradition it was a day of preparation and fasting prior to celebrating All Saints' day. It certainly wasn't associated with pranks, spooks, ghouls and witches but much more about preparing our hearts and minds to remember the Saints and those Christians who had died and joined the Communion of Saints. The festival that followed was deliberately designed to counter some of the superstitions surrounding the old end to summer and the coming of winter - the old Celtic festival of Samhain. Within church history it was only later that the commemoration of the dead, All Souls followed All Saints. It has become today an opportunity to remember loved ones who have passed and to give thanks for lives well led. As Christians we can rejoice that those who die in faith are now at rest and peace with God.

"But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep."

1 Thessalonians 4:13-14

In more recent liturgical thinking this season now marks the beginning of the Kingdom season when we reflect on what it means to be citizens of heaven. However it is the idea of setting aside a day of fasting and prayer which struck me. I think somewhere along the way we have lost the real art of fasting not least because various slimming companies have rather stolen the idea to simply mean going without food! Fasting is not simply about going without food or giving something up, it is primarily about taking something on, it is about giving ourselves space and time to allow God to speak with us and to shape who we are. It also isn't about telling everyone that we are doing it to draw attention to our spiritual well-being. Jesus was clear that fasting is something we do quietly and privately.

Fasting in biblical terms is also a call to action. It is a moment when we draw near to God but we also look out to the world in acts of love and service. Fasting in the scriptures is always for a purpose beyond ourselves and for the benefit of others. It is part of the mission of the church that we are called to serve those who we live amongst and to reach out with God's love to our world. Seen through God's eyes fasting is a call to action and mission.

"Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover him, ..." Isaiah 58:6-7

As October brings autumn on and the nights draw in let us not forget to pray, give thanks for loved ones we see no longer and remember that we are called to serve our communities.

Brown Clee Medical Practice Community Group and
Brown Clee Health and Well-being Community Society Ltd (BCH&WBS)
3rd Public Update
August 2024

Many of you will be aware that the Brown Clee Medical Practice Community Group have been working on developing a strategy to purchase and run the Brown Clee Medical premises at Ditton Priors and Stottesdon.

As a result of much research and consultation, a new community benefit society has been registered by the name of Brown Clee Health and Well-being Community Society Ltd. This entity will replace the former unincorporated entity, the BCMP Community Group, which will be formally wound up at a Special Meeting on 24th September 2024 at 1800 hrs in Ditton Priors Pavilion.

The Society will apply for grants from various sources, followed by a Community Share offer allowing members to purchase shares in the Society. The money raised will enable the community to purchase the premises at Ditton priors and Stottesdon, thereby securing their future for the community. It is Dr. Bassett's express wish that the premises are owned and run by the local community rather than by a commercial, limited company who's prime consideration would be returning a profit to their shareholders.

The Committee has also come to the conclusion that this project provides an additional opportunity to help fund and manage other health related services and activities within the Practice catchment area. Therefore, the Objects of the BCH&WCS Ltd are wholly charitable with the intention to obtain charitable status with HMRC at a suitable point in the future.

There is currently no firm date when the purchase of the properties will happen, although it is unlikely to be before the fourth quarter of 2025. This timescale should allow the Society time to accumulate sufficient grant and share ownership funds to proceed with the purchase.

As with the previous Community Group, Membership of the BCH&WCS Ltd will be open to any patient of the Brown Clee Medical Practice. Membership will be attained through the purchase of shares. Further information will be communicated in due course. Saint of the Month -Saint Teresa of Avila

1515 - 1582 15th October

eresa was born to an aristocratic family in Avila,
Spain.

She was educated by Augustinian nuns in the town. During her time there whilst she was recovering from illness, she studied the works of Jerome, which were written to the early church providing instruction on

a Christian moral life. He often focused on how women should live a life devoted to Jesus. This influenced her decision to become a nun and she entered a Carmelite convent at Avila in Castile when she was aged twenty.

A year later she fell ill a second time, and was treated outside the convent, but returned again three years later after she had recovered. During her time within the order she experienced divine visions, including a remarkable experience as if a spear of divine love were piercing her heart.

In 1568 she founded her own reformed Carmelite monastery at Durelo. She went on to found 17 more convents with the support of her close friend Saint John of the Cross.

All these communities were disciplined and poor, with an emphasis on the priority of the sisters to pray.

She wrote a treatise called "The Way to Perfection" for her nuns. She was a warm and tender person with a sense of humour. Being small in stature she described herself as 'half a friar'. She also wrote to an ally that, 'God treats his friends terribly, though he does them no wrong in this, since he treated his Son in the same way.'

Although she was a strict adherent to the discipline of prayer, she was a cheerful person. Saint Teresa travelled extensively and fought against opposition to reform the whole Carmelite order.

She continued to write producing an autobiography many letters and a second spiritual work, "The Interior Castle".

Her lasting legacy was to underscore the importance of a reflective and contemplative living, and for a simple life of service.

She wrote:

'Though we do not have our Lord with us in bodily presence, we have our neighbour, who, for the ends of love and loving service, is as good as our Lord himself'.

This month, Anne has given us **Part II of a brief history of Aston Botterell Church**, Part I of which appeared on the back cover of the September WN. **These events were recorded by the Revd Edwin Lipscomb** during his time as Rector of Aston Botterell.

"The Rectory

The first house was built 1844. The last Duke [of Cleveland] told me that he and his late brother contributed to two houses, then the Revd Forbes Smith de Heriz, not finding the front part sufficient for his purpose, made an appeal to Raby Castle and with a loan of £800 a new front was erected, the back part undisturbed, This would be about 1860.



Cottages

There are two ancient cottages, one known as Cockshall which my late brother, the Cannon - an authority - said was 'decidedly Elizabethan'. The other on the road to Norton Brook, built about the time of Charles 2nd.

The parish clerk Benji Wellings of the forge have been as a family in the parish quite 200 years.

The oldest farmer who has held his farm longest is Mr G. Radnor - "The Ford" His late father going back about 60 yrs, Every other farm is held by farmers who have lived in the parish not sooner than 1884.

During my absence from Aston Botterell. 1884-1900 (my benefice being sequestrated near bankruptcy), the Rev A.J Warren was in charge.

The two previous Rectors of the parish:

The Revd Warwick Oben Gurney MA, born 1779 - D. 1849 instituted about 1805 (actually in 1823, the Revd Edmund Dana having been the Rector from 1805 until his death in 1823). He was curate to his father in a Cornwall parish and assisted him in the Benefice. W. O. G. visited occasionally to Aston Botterell. None of the old parishioners remembered him.

The Revd Forbes Smith de Heriz (surnamed de Heriz later) born 1814 D 1882, patron the Duke of Cleveland. Raby Castle Co. Durham.

My father told me (his father Chaplain at Raby 1780) that the Shropshire came to the Vanes from the Pulteneys, how he did not know. This would account for all the Vanes having property at Bath where there is Pulteney street."




Ride & Stride





We have now submitted these back to the diocese. Our next step will be to see if we can get a grant from the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust to help pay for the work. We will also be carrying out maintenance on some trees, cutting back branches close to the main road. We are also installing new heating elements; our heating system is currently only working at half-power. We hope that this work will make the church much warmer over the winter.

Our harvest festival on 15th September was memorable for a number of reasons, not least a fallen cable meaning we had no electric power to the church. That however is not the same as no energy in the building; we had 18 people, generously supported by Chetton and the hymns were sung lustily without the organ. 
wonderful to welcome back ex-Billingsley residents Sue Bates and Bonnie and Mike Garvey; we miss you!



News from St Peter's

Elizabeth Bebb writes:

Harvest is always a wonderful time of year at St. Peter's Chelmarsh. We spend the summer in the village watching the harvest being gathered in from the fields and picking fruit and vegetables from gardens, trees and hedgerows. The celebration in September seems incredibly timely and draws the local community together to appreciate what nature has provided and the hard work of the community. We are lucky at St. Peter's that the church is always decorated beautifully, and our PCC and their helpers always arrange a delicious harvest supper in the local village hall. As always this was well attended, and we thank everyone for their kind donations and for their part in the harvest and the celebrations. The 100 club draw was taken, however it was too late for publication this month, please see the noticeboards or next month's magazine for more details.

Glenys, Barbara and Janet took part in the Ride and Stride on 14th September. This was an opportunity for anyone to visit churches in the area and raise money via sponsorship. The sponsorship money is split and 50% goes to the local church with 50% going to Historic Churches Shropshire. This is especially close to our hearts this year as we are hoping to apply to the trust for funding to help us repair the bell tower (more on that below).

From the Registers

Funeral: Nigel Palmer was buried in the churchyard with his parents. He lived in Highley in recent years.

Baptisms: Elsie Jones was baptised in July. The family live in Highley but have close ties to Chelmarsh and St.

Peter's. It was lovely to welcome Elsie to the church family on such a joyous occasion.

Tilly Jennings was baptised in August. Her grandparents are long-standing members of the church and the community here and her mum Katie Jennings (nee Price) grew up here. It was lovely to welcome her and her wider family to St. Peter's Chelmarsh for such a special occasion.

Update on the bell tower and bells:

The bell tower project is ongoing. We have secured the area with red and white tape to alert people to the potential danger. We will soon be able to apply to the faculty for permission to do the work. We also aim to apply for funding for the project, which is likely to be expensive due to the need for good quality materials and scaffolding to access the area.

Additionally we have had the bells checked by Ashley from Hereford. This has led to some bad news as the bells cannot be rung at the present time. The gudgeons (a useful word for scrabble) and one clapper are loose and bolts need

tightening which could lead to issues if we use them. We have a plan to get them back up and running, and aim to do this as soon as possible. Again this may require an application for additional funding.

We hear that - a kerfuffle was caused in St. Peter's at Communion during the month.... as a member of the congregation went to pray, he had a shock: a four-legged friend hopped by. At the end of the service a search was made for the amphibian which had made a bid for freedom towards the back of the church and was spotted by Phoebe Strong who has very sharp eyes for her age. The brown toad (very well camouflaged on the wooden floor) was removed from the church. However in the porch 5 tiny brown toads were discovered and one larger green one. All were moved to safety... perhaps a rendition of 'All things bright and beautiful' attracted them?

Caring for God's Acre



By October, the areas of long, meadow grass within a churchyard or cemetery will have been mown short and raked, making it is easy to wander around and look for colourful fungi.

Old grasslands, like those found in burial grounds, have a fabulously complex web of life beneath the sward, of which fungi are a key part. These grassland fungi, which are different species from those found growing on trees or on deadwood on the ground, are 'indicator species' showing an observer that this grassland is precious, has not been ploughed, fertilised or treated with chemicals for a long time (if ever).

The mycelium of the fungi is the part below ground, this consists of thread-like 'hyphae' which may be connected to a range of grasses, mosses, trees and flowering plants. After rain, and often in the autumn, the mycelium pushes up the fungal equivalent of a fruit above the ground where we can see it. Fungi are largely made of water and so can appear quickly, pumped up by hydrostatic power. The purpose of this is to spread the species far and wide, with a single mushroom able to contain vast numbers of microscopic spores. In the grassland the fungi you find might be waxcaps and pinkgills both of which are shaped like a small mushroom, or spindles and earth tongues, both of which are long and thin. Many fungi are long-lived and may not fruit every year, some only fruiting once in a decade so are rarely seen. They continue to grow and spread beneath the ground however.

Grassland fungi have long captured our imaginations as their names indicate. Look for scarlet, parrot, snowy, butter and ballerina waxcaps. How about skinny club, crested coral, golden spindles or hairy earthtongue.

Grassland fungi need our help so please look after them. Always rake off the cuttings after mowing, strimming or scything grassland, whether it is long or short grass. This helps to keep the soil fertility low which the fungi need, as do the wildflowers. Avoid any chemicals and keep grasslands managed with regular cutting so that they don't turn become coarse and rough.

You may be rewarded with a scattering of colourful fungi looking like jewels across the sward. As well as looking pretty and adding to the richness of biodiversity they, and the other plants, lichens, invertebrates and microbes are all storing carbon in our soils, one of the many natural solutions to climate change.

Molecule of the Month - Semaglutide

Prof David Poyner writes:

Two are better than one: a new combination for treating weight-gain.



One of the areas of particular interest at the moment in drug development is for medicines to deal with obesity; being overweight. The "obesity crisis" affects most developed countries; our

bodies evolved to deal with long periods of starvation and cannot adapt to the situation in the West where food is in surplus, particularly "fattening" foods. The result is a growing medical problem; a few days ago I was talking to a 33-year old, just diagnosed with diabetes, a condition which is often associated with obesity. The medical evidence is that for many people, dieting is not good at long-term control of weight, at least by itself. In obesity, the biological signals that tell us to stop eating usually do not work; hence people find it very hard not to eat. Consequently there is enormous interest in drugs that can be used alongside life-style changes such as exercising and diet, to help weight control.

Over the last decade there has been a lot of interest in mimicking hormones called "incretins" to reduce weight loss. An incretin is a hormone released after a meal to help the body process the meal; part of this is to send signals to tell the person to stop eating. I have a colleague in Cambridge, Professor Graham Ladds, who has done much work on this and we have sometimes collaborated over the last 15 or so years. One of the most important incretins is called GLP-1. It is a peptide; in other words, a mini-protein and acts on a class of receptors that I have studied all of my career. Peptides do not normally make good drugs, as they are easily broken down in the stomach, although they can be injected (as happens with insulin) and there are other tricks that can make them easier to use. Consequently, GLP-1 analogues such as semaglutide are now showing great promise in reducing weight.

No matter how good one drug is, there is always the desire to find something that works better. Some years ago, it was discovered that GLP-1 and semaglutide bind to nerves in the brain; these send signals to tell the body to stop eating. These nerves also respond to glutamic acid, a chemical released from surrounding nerves; the glutamic acid activates nerves to tell the body to eat more. So, in theory, combining GLP-1 or semaglutide with another drug that would stop glutamic acid from working should lead to even more weight loss. There is however a problem; there are drugs that stop glutamic acid from working, but they also produce hallucinations and various psychological problems. This issue is that glutamic acid acts on many nerves in the brain; what was needed was just to direct the blocker to the same nerves that semaglutide acted on, which just stop us eating.

In a piece of simple-minded chemistry, that I would have predicted would not have worked, the glutamic acid blocker, an agent called MK801 which has been around since the 1980s, was physically attached to GLP-1. The theory was that the GLP-1 would send the blocker only to the nerves involved in eating, as these are specifically recognised by GLP-1. Much to my surprise, a recent paper shows that this works; the combined drug really does out-perform GLP-1 and semaglutide in reducing weight, albeit in mice. The next step will be to carry out clinical trials on humans. If the large-scale clinical trials go well, we will have a new and effective agent to help control weight within a few years.
