

February letter from Bishop David



The New Year is underway, and I am standing in for Bishop Richard while he is on sabbatical. He has given us themes for recent years: Prayer, Faith, and now it's

Engagement – with Celebration to come! There's a lovely sense of flow between them, I think. Let me say what I mean...

Our church is rooted in Christ, and our relationship with him in prayer is where it all begins. Without the roots, nothing else will grow. St John loves to use the word "Abiding" for this relationship – one of peace and permanence, of being where we belong. "Abide in me as I abide in you." (John 15.4) When we find our place, we find our peace and become people of peace. We are seeing a global increase in anxiety, and "We are Farming Minds" has shown how that is true locally, too. If we can be people of peace and offer places of peace, we can make a difference in real, local lives.

Out of the roots of prayer come shoots of faith: "I am the vine; you are the branches." (John 15.5) As we abide in Christ, so we come to trust him more as the well-spring of our life. We seek security in all sorts of things, some good, some less so; but also realise that what they offer is limited and sometimes deceptive. I sensed this Christmas afresh how fundamental the Christmas presence of Christ was compared with any of the presents life can bring, right here, in a broken world of lost homes and lives. I have friends on my heart for whom Christmas brought bad news not good, and my longing for them is that they will know Christ's presence in their predicaments.


Then, the shoots of faith lead to the fruits of engagement, as lives are touched and changed for the better. "Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit." (John 15.5) It may well be that the need to find peace and solace in a disastrous world first draws us to the church. But as Christ grows in us and we in him, we realise that the church is not an escape craft from the world but a landing craft into it. God's great desire is that the whole world should be saved. "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." (John 3,16) And that is worth a Year of Engagement in God's mission with the world around us now, and a Year of Celebration when it comes!



Study Course for Lent 2025

Dear All,

Lent will start on Ash Wednesday, 5th March, and as is traditional, we will all be following a new study course over the following 6 weeks until Easter.

Last year we looked at Mark's Gospel. This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed, the great poem that we recite every communion service which explores what we and virtually all Christians have believed over those centuries.

The Apostles' Creed is a shorter version of this which we use at Morning Prayer.

To celebrate this anniversary and also to understand more about the basis of our faith, this Lent our existing Severn Valley benefice study groups (Tuesday Bible Study, Wednesday Ladies Group, Wednesday Zoom Group) will be looking at the creeds. We will follow a course developed some years ago; Pilgrim: The Creeds Book 5 (Grow Stage) by Jane Williams, Paula Gooder, Stephen Cottrell, Steven Croft, Robert Atwell, Graham Tomlin, Martyn Snow, Mary Gregory - Paperback - 9780715144442 The cost is £4 if anyone wishes to buy a copy of the book, although this is not necessary to follow the course.

Even if you do not normally follow one of our study groups, please consider joining us for our Lent journey this year. We are also working with our friends in the neighbouring Brown Clee Benefice on the same course.

February reflection

One of the inevitabilities in life is that we are all getting older.

With the passage of time, we maybe spend time looking back on where we have come from and to a certain extent where we are heading.

We celebrate in February the presentation of Christ at the temple - often called Candlemas. In the reading from Luke's gospel, we read about Simeon and Anna both waiting patiently for the arrival of the Messiah at the temple. This story is one of hope as Mary and Joseph bring Jesus, the long-awaited Saviour of Israel, for his presentation at the temple.

This is a touching story of fulfillment, but not quite the experience of all of us as we enter into later life. I suspect that there are many questions, what will happen, will I be a burden, will my memory fail? This was not the case for Simeon and Anna: they knew that there were promises to be fulfilled by God and this was their focus.

Old age can not only bring its own concerns but can also provide a sense of reprioritising, the mists clear and we can see what matters and what does not. We can spend more time 'being' rather than 'doing', ambition to 'get on' becomes less important. Loving, acceptance and healing of relationship become our priority.

In our journey as disciples of Christ we should also be mindful that the work of the Holy Spirit in us is not finished, and like Simeon and Anna we too wait for fulfillment of God's promises of restoration and renewal. In the meantime, we still have lots to do and many things to achieve.

In my work as a Mission Enabler with responsibility for church and society I see around much that is done by people who are more advanced in years, their work with the voluntary sector, foodbanks and pastoral care within our communities to name just a few.

Jesus enables us to be his Kingdom bringers here in our world - and whilst we are this side of eternity, there is work for us to do.




And the Little Explorers put on a wonderful nativity play with songs for us to enjoy.


Services are held at Aston Botterell Church on the First Sunday every month at 11.30 am.






> It has been some years since I last visited, in the days when it was

Billingsley meets the Seychelles!

Revd David Poyner writes:

One of the pleasures of being a vicar is that you sometimes get interesting requests. A few weeks ago, Kina forwarded an email to me from a Richard Grainger, asking about a friend of his, the late John Mascarenhas, who died in 1997.

Mascarenhas lived an interesting life. He was born in Kenya and for a period served in the British Army. He was closely connected with the Seychelles, working as a journalist and politician. The Seychelles were still technically a British colony in the early 1970s but Mascarenhas was an advocate of independence. In 1971, due to his political activities, he was expelled from Kenya and moved to the Seychelles where he helped produce a pamphlet exposing racism in the islands. This earned the displeasure of the Governor, who declared him a "prohibited immigrant" in 1972 and attempted to expel him. Mascarenhas was however well-connected and his case was taken up in the UK Parliament by Leo Abse, a campaigning MP. He spent time in the UK before the attempted expulsion was reversed. After independence, Mascarenhas was elected Chairman of the People's Assembly of Seychelles and in 1993 became the High Commissioner for the country in the UK. He was also a very active sportsman; an accomplished gymnast in his younger days, he became president of the Seychelles National Olympic Committee.

And the Billingsley connection? Whilst in this country in 1972 he spent time at Billingsley Rectory, the guest of the owner, John Kinch. Richard has asked me if anyone knows about this. To the best of my knowledge, John Kinch lived in Billingsley from the mid-1960s; he was active in the church, serving as churchwarden (technically Rector's Warden) to the Rev Dore. I think Mr Kinch left in 1972 but I know nothing else about him; I have no idea what his connection might have been with Mascarenhas and the Seychelles.



Has anyone got any memories of Mr Kinch? Any information would be greatly appreciated!

With thanks to Apple maps – I now know where the Seychelles is... or maybe are.... the most remote place I could ever imagine and a tiny pinhead under the big white dot! Ed.

Molecule of the Month

SICDPK27 and tasteless tomatoes!

At the risk of stating the obvious, SICDPK27 does not have a particularly memorable name; in modern biology, nomenclature committees abound and there is a great drive to make names "systematic". Thus "Old yellow enzyme" is now NADP dehydrogenase. I have to admit that I am not entirely sure what SICDPK27 actually stands for; the "CPDK" bit is "calcium dependant protein kinase", it is the 27th in a series of proteins that have that function (see below) but the SI bit eludes me. However, whatever its name, it has an important role in tomatoes, perhaps one we wish it didn't have. It makes them tasteless; at least that is what it does in the typical supermarket offering.

The tomatoes that we buy in shops or sometimes grow at home are derived from a plant that grows in the wild. These produce tomatoes that are sweet but also small; about the size of a cherry. Shops

and food processors generally want larger tomatoes so as years gone by, producers have tried to grow tomatoes that are as big as possible. They have succeeded, magnificently.

However, as size has increased, flavour has decreased.

Tomatoes taste sweet because they contain sugar; technically, the sweetness comes from sucrose, identical with household sugar that we use to sweeten food and drinks. Tomatoes make sugar by a protein called sucrose synthetase; in this case the name perfectly describes its job which is to synthesise sucrose. Modern tomatoes have much less of this enzyme than the small, wild tomatoes. Somehow, in selecting for varieties of

tomatoes that grow large, the breeders have inadvertently also selected for fruits that are defective in sucrose synthetase. Now, a group from China have gone back to the wild tomatoes to try and understand why this has happened; enter SICDPK27.

SICDPK27 is a protein kinase; this means that its job is to chemically attach a unit, the phosphate group, to proteins it recognises. This is the equivalent of putting a label on a parcel or letter; the phosphate group effectively tells the cell what to do with the protein. Unfortunately for tomato breeders, in this case, it tells the cell to destroy sucrose synthetase. Without sucrose synthetase, the tomatoes cannot make enough sugar, hence the large, red but tasteless fruits on many supermarket shelves. However, the Chinese group appear to have found a solution. They have been able to engineer the large tomatoes to reduce the activity of SICDPK27 so that it no longer marks the sucrose synthetase for destruction. These tomatoes still are of a suitable size, but they are much larger.

A commentator on this work has noted it was only possible because the scientists were able to go back to the natural tomatoes to work out why they were sweet.

This, in turn, was possible because of conservation efforts to ensure that the natural tomatoes are still abundant in the wild.



The afternoon was, as always, the most enjoyable end to this year's meetings and in January we have our annual dinner at The Down Inn, before meeting again in February.

This year on Thursday 13th February, Nancy Lowe will be talking about 'Gardening with Wildflowers'. Nancy is an RHS qualified organic gardener, ecological garden designer, permaculturalist and writer with a passion for sustainable and eco-friendly gardening. Nancy grows food, makes beautiful wildlife gardens and writes with an infectious joy for all things plant related. This talk promises to be very informative.

LOVE YOUR YEW WEEK!!

8th - 14th February 2025

THE ANCIENT YEW GROUP (AYG) IS A CONSERVATION BODY WHICH COLLECTS FIELD DATA AND HISTORIC MATERIAL ABOUT OUR OLDEST YEW TREES.

This month, we feature "Love your Yew Week". This is now an annual event promoted by the Ancient Yew Group (AYG) to encourage us to look after the ancient and majestic yew trees that dot our landscape and are often the stars of our churchyards.

AYG tells us:

"The theme of the week is ivy growth on yews. Ivy, while valuable to wildlife, can impede a yew's ability to thrive, especially on old trees. Love Your Yew Week 2025 will provide guidance for carefully removing ivy from yew trees, ensuring these fantastic trees remain healthy and resilient for generations to come. Join us this February in showing appreciation for these ancient giants and helping to secure their future!

The majority of ancient yews found in England and Wales grow on the consecrated ground around churches. We can be sure that those we have so far recorded owe their survival largely to the protection afforded by their location.

The problem is establishing who is directly responsible for protecting our oldest trees. It is likely that in many instances there is no protection at all, or that responsibility lies solely with the Vicar acting with their Church Warden, Parochial Church Council or District Council. Tree expertise in such decision-making bodies is often lacking, as indeed are the funds necessary to carry out the best remedial work. It is not always an individual church or diocese that is responsible for grounds and tree maintenance, and some burial grounds have been taken over by the local authority. This does not necessarily mean that an old yew will receive sensitive treatment."



During 2024, AYG attracted sponsorship from other conservation bodies, including Caring for God's Acre, and now has an excellent website, which features a database of ancient yews across the whole country, their locations, and whether they are accessible for visitors:

A New Year Letter from Uganda

January 2025 From Sarah and Simon Cawdell, at AJLTC Gulu, Uganda Dear Friends,

Thank you for your support and prayers. January is a long month, and we have very much appreciated your prayers to keep us sustained in Christ.

All is well here. None of the college bureaucracy is sorted yet – neither registration, nor land boundaries, so please keep praying. The Diocese Coffee cooperative is now certified, so work can begin towards the coffee mother garden. Also Simon has almost achieved permission to arrange for a borehole to be drilled on the Diocesan Land. He has a letter of no objection from National Water! The final stage is a letter of permission from the Ministry.

I thought that it is high time to introduce you to some of the people among whom we live - about fifty students and twelve staff. I hope in a few sentences to sketch some of the challenges and joys of their lives.

Let me start with **Stephen** who is a second year student. His business is as a mason (which is how builders are referred to here), so he is always looking for more work which I can give him on the compound to enable him to make a living whilst he also studies. Like many workmen he is enthusiastic for a new project, but not a natural completer finisher. I was amused as I supervised his parish placement last month that his Parish Priest made the same observation. Stephen is now aware, and willing to work with this self-knowledge. Whilst he was in the first year, and his wife was expecting another child, he went on the parish 'poor list' which is the equivalent of using a food bank I suppose – the family received monthly food parcels from the church. It is hard for the family as our students are often also the



Then there is **Philda**, also a second year whose family consists of a mother and an older, married sister. Her mother suffers from significant medical issues. Without a father figure there is no one to bring in any support for the family. Fortunately Philda's fees are paid by her Diocese (Nebbi, west of here). She is asking me for work so that she can earn money for soap and exercise books and other necessities of life. I will find her some weeding and light work around the compound for which I can pay, so that she keeps some self respect whilst benefitting from the generosity of a supporter.

Frederick is a delightful and hard working first year student, with a keen faith.

But a neighbour allowed his cows to feed on Fredrick's maize crop – so he has very little to show for the hard work of growing a couple of acres of maize. (People will often test the patience of Christians, expecting them to freely forgive such wrongs!) He has also come back looking for work, and because he came on time, whilst others were slow to return, he has had some days in the field down by the water source making bricks. This is extraordinarily hard work requiring physical strength - mixing mud, putting the mud into moulds, laying the bricks to dry, turning them, and then stacking the dried bricks into a kiln and burning them for twenty four hours. It is a useful way of making fees money because it can only be done at this time of year, and the college will use the bricks for the construction of its planned new classrooms.

Charonne in the third year has come back with Horeb, her son, who is still breastfeeding and now walking well. The students generally are delighted to have a youngster around, and college is more of family with a shared child. He greets me putting his hand in mine with a lovely smile.

Melki is an enthusiast for life, and has embraced Farming God's Way/ Forward in Farming (you can find it on You Tube – basically no dig gardening). If someone is going to ask a question and probe further in class it will be Melki!

Andrew who is very bright, but having been poisoned sometime back, is often unwell. (Poisoning is a not unusual a problem here. There are plenty of natural poisons available and jealousy and anger are rife in the communities.) He is a natural leader and evangelist. I pray for his healing, but wonder how God uses him more effectively in his weakness.

Ronald makes his living as a carpenter, and makes kitchens. He is always generous with his skills to help in the college. He is making new 'ministers chairs' for the new chapel. These are being paid for out of the Sunday collection.

Samson Lolo lives on the border of the national park so it is hard to grow food crops because the elephants come out and eat the maize. Elephant are as determined as squirrels only bigger, and more destructive. (In some places they are kept at bay by 'bee fencing' as a swarm of bees is one of the few things that does deter them.)

Innocent who is the chapel warden, and loves playing the local harp. He is often to be found in chapel making music and worshipping God.

And colleagues at the college.

David, the administrator who comes in almost every day, and keeps an eye on the stores, manages the accounts, the exam results, advises me where to buy things and how much I am being cheated for when I am given a price for anything.

Rev'd Jane, the Academic Registrar who is the other full time employee of the college; does some teaching, and sorts out the placements for students. Jane also works as the local prison chaplain, and has a regular ministry in the different prisons in town. (It is normal here for full time people to have more than one other job. Three full time jobs is not unusual.)

CT our caretaker, who spends much of his day sweeping up leaves, but also weighs out the daily allowance of food, looks after the dog, and generally keeps the place running smoothly. He has been at the college about 25 years, and is that 'heart of the community' character that all good institutions have. If you really want to know what is going on you ask CT, who will smile knowingly, chuckle and tell you at least what he thinks you need to know!

Jacqueline and Jenny, our cooks who prepare sweet tea in the morning and beans with posho for lunch and supper. They keep the students fed, and commandeer help if there is extra food such as green vegetable to prepare.

These are just a few of the individuals who bring colour and purpose to our days here. They come back to college full of stories of God at work in their homes and villages, of churches planted and missions run.

This is the dry season, so we don't expect any significant rain before March. Term has started and the students are delighted to see progress in college development. At the weekend we worked together to move the bricks which had dried towards the place where they will be burnt and we hope to dig the foundations for the new classrooms before Easter. But not until after some rain as the ground is extremely hard at the moment.

Simon is continuing with the coffee and cocoa plantation — watering each plant twice a week to help them through their first dry season and mulching with crop residues and pig manure. He has almost got permission to drill a borehole in the place where he hopes to establish a poultry project next January, and is praying for funding to come through from a government agency (long on promise and short on delivery — the same the world over) for an expansion of the coffee plantation via a 'mother garden' (from which cuttings are propagated).

Do continue to pray for the registration of the college. Some students have not come back because we aren't registered yet, which is going to be a problem both for the viability of the college and the on going ministry of the church.

We are also very grateful for a new garage on the college grounds in order to keep the car we have been loaned safe.
