Wearing clothes such as trousers, joggers and tops during the daytime rather than pyjamas encourages patients to get up, get dressed, and get moving! Maintaining their normal routine can also help to prevent "deconditioning" in hospital.

IWD is an annual global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women, and marking a call to action for accelerating women's equality. March letter from the Archdeacon of Hereford



As we begin Lent you might think that there is nothing new to say about this period of the church year. As I was reflecting on what I would write I was reminded that March 2025 also marks the twentieth anniversary return of one of my favourite cultural icons. Doctor Who returned to our television screens on 26th March 2005 and a whole new generation of children and adults were introduced to what has and continues to be a British cultural phenomenon on a par with Sherlock Holmes. Even if you don't like it and science fiction isn't your thing it has even generated entries in the Oxford English Dictionary with Dalek and Tardis now part of our language.

You might be thinking what has Doctor Who and lent have in common and to be fair on the face of it very little! Yet at the heart of Doctor Who is the important idea of 'regeneration' by which the Doctor changes his or her appearance and is completely renewed. The Christian faith also has regeneration at the heart of its message. Lent is an opportunity for each of us to open ourselves up to the power of God to bring spiritual regeneration in our lives. Lent is traditionally a period of self-reflection, abstinence and discipline which are not words which create a lot of excitement in our very instant society yet it is these very straightforward spiritual disciplines that lead to spiritual growth and help us to deepen our faith in God. St Paul writing to the early church in Rome challenges us to be renewed and regenerated:

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind."

The New Testament writers recognised that it is only when our inner spiritual life is brought to life that at pattern of behaviour, thoughts and way of living is radically changed to become more like Jesus. Lent allows us the space and time to reflect on how we live and seek God's forgiveness and strength to turn our lives in a different direction. The bible calls this repentance but in effect it means turning our lives in a completely new direction and living God's way rather than our own way. God will never force us or compel us to choose to live according to the rules of the kingdom but instead he stands ready to bring us spiritual regeneration when we turn to him. This is what is meant by John in his gospel when he talks about being born again. This is not some evangelical American term but the words of Jesus to Nicodemus when he enquires about how to live God's way.

"Now there was a Pharisee, a man named Nicodemus who was a member of the Jewish ruling council. He came to Jesus at night and said, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the signs you are doing if God were not with him." Jesus replied, "Very truly I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God unless they are born again."

John 3:1-3

As you approach this coming Lent why not give yourself the time to examine your life and faith and allow the Holy Spirit to challenge and change you to be more like Jesus. It is only when we invite God to help us to live according to his values and to help us lay aside the things that hinder our journey with him that we can truly begin to become the people that God has created us to be and to fulfil the potential he has given us. This is true regeneration that is life changing and life affirming and enables us as followers of Jesus to be signposts of the kingdom in our communities. Paul in his letter to Titus sums this up perfectly:

"But when the kindness and the love of God our Saviour toward us appeared, not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour, ..."

Titus 3:4-6


As we begin our Lenten journey, rather than give something up, we should instead seek to take something up and ask God to begin afresh the process of regeneration in each of us as we seek to journey together and grow in our faith.

Lent will start on Ash Wednesday, 5th March, and as is traditional, we will all be following a new study course over the following 6 weeks until Easter.

This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the **Nicene Creed**, the great poem that we recite every communion service which explores what we and virtually all Christians have believed over those centuries: the text appears in full on page 24 of this WN.

To celebrate this anniversary and also to understand more about the basis of our faith, this Lent our existing Severn Valley benefice study groups (Tuesday Bible Study, Wednesday Ladies Group, Wednesday Zoom Group) will be looking at the creeds. We will follow a course developed some years ago; Pilgrim: The Creeds Book 5 (Grow Stage) by Jane Williams, Paula Gooder, Stephen Cottrell, Steven Croft, Robert Atwell, Graham Tomlin, Martyn Snow, Mary Gregory - Paperback - 9780715144442 The cost is £4 if anyone wishes to buy a copy of the book, although this is not necessary to follow the course.

Even if you do not normally follow one of our study groups, please consider joining us for our Lent journey this year. We are also working with our friends in the neighbouring Brown Clee Benefice on the same course.



There is a lot of news from CfGA this month! The website is always well worth a visit: https://www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk – and offers discounts for members too!


But meanwhile here are some more snippets to enjoy.

Lent reflection

Lent has its derivation in the "lengthening of days" and has at its heart the old English word meaning Spring. It was observed as a period of preparation for those approaching Baptism at Easter. In more recent times it is a period during which Christians remember the events leading up to the death of Jesus Christ. We contemplate his testing in the wilderness, his life, and his teaching.

It is also an opportunity for Christians humbly to examine their lives and through prayer, study of scripture and acts of self-denial, to restate and renew their love for God. This spiritual spring clean can be a testing time. Through reflection, we can see more quickly who we are and what we hold most dear to us. It can also bring to the fore some aspects of who we are that are less than perfect.

Many still see Lent simply as a time of self-denial when we give up this or that as a form of penance, but Lent is so much more than self-denial. It also a time for liberation, for setting ourselves free of all that gets in the way of being the person that God would want us to be.

Whether you are a Christian or not, it is a good time just to take stock of where you are, and in which direction you are heading. For Christians, whose lives are rooted in the love of Jesus and in moving close to him, Lent helps to put aside all that gets in the way, and to put Jesus front and centre.

I would urge you this Lent to make time to just 'be' and to focus on whether those things we hold most dear to us have the proper place in our lives.

Spotlight on our history

Further extracts from the notebooks of the Revd Edwin F Lipscomb, (1831 – 1923), Rector of St Michael and All Angels, Aston Botterell, from 1883.

Charlcot - this is an ancient part of our parish. The families of King Hinskernk (the charity of Mrs H Povey comes from ... in the 19th century and earlier there was a paper mill on the bank of the stream below the house ... then on Cinder Hill are remains of Furness oven still to be seen ... and scattered about are debris which show they have been fired .. A hundred years ago there was quite a hive of men in this corner of Aston Botterell.

The Bold Farm – the archaeological society stated that on the site of the Bold was a nunnery, which went the way of all these religious houses at the reformation it was its said to have been affiliated to White Ladies which gave shelter to Charles 2nd.

A grange took the place of the nunnery and was occupied for a century or two by well-known families in our registers.

The late J ,Sparrow Esq. the last owner told me he had found human remains in his orchard the cemetery of the religious house.

The Fox inn is now 1 and 2 Fox cottages

Alms houses - these stood in a field about ¼ mile from the forge. (Benj Wellings) and fell into decay about 40 years in age...there were no funds to maintain them .. and there is no trace of them now.

Manor farm - part of the house may be two centuries old .. the ancient family of Kinnerish ... formerly resided here ... part of the moat is still to be seen The Hall Farm – now known as the Manor House ..The home of the de Botterells is part Elizabethan and some on the ground floor date 1571 with carvings initials N A B at the back of the manor ...

In a field adjoining are mounds and in the summer of 1901 it was visited by miss Auden, a member of the archaeological society and notes .. which pointed out these mounds are on the site of the Saxon fort of the de Botterells who were left undisturbed at the conquest in order to quard against Wales.

Outside the field is what remains of the ancient way from the Titterstone hills to Bridgnorth

Well-behaved wildflowers only, please!!


espite the cold in February, Nancy Lowe, The Natural Gardener, visited our gardening club and cheered us up with her infectious passion for wildflower gardening.

Nancy explained that growing wildflowers in our gardens can be challenging! Many are sadly too boisterous to grow in this way and will create a lot of work for us, as we try to protect our traditional garden variety plants that are sharing their space.


Wildflowers have a range of behaviours that they use to allow them to grow amongst a diverse community of other plants, perfect for meadows, but not ideal for areas such as garden flower beds. However, Nancy explained the

benefits of growing wildflowers for wildlife and suggested that careful selection of 'well behaved' wildflowers make it possible to incorporate them into our vegetable plots as well as our beds and borders.

Amongst the suggestions for planting in our borders are Foxgloves, Nigella, Sweet Rocket and Honesty. These are self-seeders and they can be easily weeded out or transplanted to places where there are gaps they can fill. If they have a spreading root system, they don't spread too




lactiflora). It is related to Harebells, but this type of bellflower grows much taller, to around 80cm, with multiple spires of bell-shaped flowers in either white, blue or pale pink. Nancy highly recommended Gladwyn Iris which flowers in late Spring. These native woodland irises do well in a shady spot, even tolerating the dry shade beneath trees and shrubs or close to house walls. Their strap-shaped leaves have a handsome presence all year round, so put them where you are able to stop and admire their flowers as they bloom.



Nancy also explained the benefits of letting grass grow long, and when to mow. Even without being a wildflower-rich lawn, simply having long grasses will be supporting a whole host of wildlife garden visitors. This includes butterflies like the Meadow Brown, Wall Brown, Gatekeeper and Ringlet butterflies. Their caterpillars need native grasses to feed on and these are present in most garden lawns. There was so much information in Nancy's talk that I could not possibly include it all here, but if you are interested in Wildlife gardening, then take a look at Nancy's website; www.thenaturalgardener.org.uk.





And all because of the railway

Back in 1995 I was weekly-commuting from Shropshire to Leeds, by train, to my then civil service base, where we were preparing to be TUPE'd out into a new organisation.

Usually, the journey was from Ludlow via Manchester, but for once, on this particular day, I went via Birmingham.

A very tiny, frail-looking elderly lady sat opposite to me across a table, and next to her a young woman. They got talking and it quickly emerged that they knew many people in common. I was absorbed in work on my laptop, juggling with the heated discussions running on the proposed arrangements for the new organisation - but their conversation became so interesting that I started to pay attention and from time to time I joined in.

The elderly lady described some of the work in which she had been involved over her lifetime. Among other things, as a member of the General Synod, she had drafted the first consultation document on the ordination of women, and had travelled to many countries to gather information and learn about their take on the question.

"You must always," she said "know the strength of other people's arguments".


If ever there was a God-sent message for me, this was it. Active listening – not just hearing, not just preparing for my own riposte to whatever another person said. It completely hit the nail on the head of the question that I was grappling with back then.

30 years later I am only just out of kindergarten on all this. It is very difficult, and hard work, and I often forget or fail. I think this lady taught me to try my best to listen, but more than that to probe and explore for the reasoning behind the positions that people take – whether I instinctively agree with them or not!

Just before the lady left the train, struggling with her tiny suitcase, she introduced herself to us.

She was Dame Christian Howard, of the Castle Howard family. The Guardian carried an obituary on this extraordinary woman in 1999.

Lovely Lichens!

Churchyards are the ideal place for a lichen enthusiast to while away many happy hours. Lichens can be found on walls, monuments, trees and, if you have ancient grassland there may be lichens within the sward as well.

To the uninitiated lichens can look broadly similar with subtle mosaics of colour, often greys and yellows forming expanding circles as they increase in size as the years go by. There is more to lichens than meets the eye however. Firstly they are two or more organisms living together as one, usually a fungus and an algae. Fungus forms the visible part of the lichen and within, protected by threads of the fungus, are cells of algae and/or cyanobacteria which photosynthesise. So the fungus provides a home and the algae provides food. Lichens reproduce through microscopic fungal spores which, if they find a suitable partner, can colonise surfaces which are not too shaded or too smooth. These spores are released from structures which look rather like tiny jam tarts, flasks or pimples!

Lichens are fantastic at surviving where other life cannot. Provided there is enough light and moisture lichens are able to grow on bare stone, not needing cracks or soil to root into. Some lichens grow very slowly, perhaps half a millimetre per year whilst others grow more quickly. Many lichens are long-lived so the lichen you see in a churchyard may be almost as old as the wall or gravestone it is growing on. Astonishingly there are over 2,000 different lichen species and it is not unusual for a single churchyard to contain more than 100 different types.

Churchyards are particularly rich in lichens as they contain so many old stones with a variety of types; limestone, sandstone, granite to name a few. Some stones are smoother, others rough and they may have differing amounts of shade, wind and moisture depending on where they are within the churchyard, which side of the monument the lichen is on, whether they are vertical, leaning or flat. The carving of the inscription itself provides microclimates with different amounts of light and moisture within the lettering. All of these changes in conditions will suit different lichen species. They are also found on trees, wooden fences and gates, grassy areas, pathways and even dustbin lids!

Most lichens offer protection to the surface they grow on and it may be easier to read lettering which is lichen-covered rather than bare, eroding stone. They do not need much care but do avoid the use of any chemicals near to lichens and definitely don't try and remove them. Lichens can die if shaded out so try and keep ivy or other climbers from encroaching over them too.

If you have never taken a closer look at a lichen then why not take a hand-lens or magnifying glass and give it a go. Lichen colonies have been described as minute, self-maintaining gardens, providing a natural cladding for the stone. They are beautiful and endlessly fascinating and if you like a challenge, why not look up the British Lichen Society website and find out more about how to id


Molecule of the Month - Metronidazole

The original wonder drugs were antibiotics.

First discovered around a century ago, they allowed what seemed to be the near miraculous recovery of people from infections which would have otherwise killed them. They remain a cornerstone of modern medicine, although there is always a battle between medicinal chemists and the organisms being targeted as the later evolve new forms of resistance. The key to success is "selective toxicity"; the antibiotic must kill the harmful organism but not the person who has the infection. That is why patients are not given disinfectants, a point famously lost on a US president during the Covid pandemic... The selectivity can come in a number of ways. Penicillin and its more modern successors work by stopping bacteria from making their outer covering, the cell wall. Our cells do not have this outer covering and so there is no chance of the antibiotic harming us directly. Other antibiotics exploit more subtle differences in biochemistry. Sometimes the selectivity comes from exploitation of basic chemistry.



Metronidazole is an antibiotic used to treat deep-seated infections; places where harmful bacteria have attacked parts of the body that have a poor blood supply and so have little oxygen (which is carried around the body in the blood). The bacteria which do this positively welcome the absence of oxygen, because they themselves do not use it, they are "anaerobic", which means that they generate their energy by chemical reactions that do not use oxygen. By contrast we need oxygen because we cannot generate the power to keep our cells alive without it.

Oxygen-using (aerobic) and anaerobic bacteria are no friends of each other; they do not grow

well together. Thus the oxygen-using bacteria sometimes produce chemicals that kill their anaerobic cousins. Metronidazole was developed from one such chemical. It resembles one of the building blocks of DNA, the material that all living organisms bar some viruses use to direct their activity. By itself, it is harmless. However, it can be converted to a chemical form known as a "free radical". A free radical can be thought of as an out-of-control dodgem car; it collides at random with any molecule it meets, destroying it. In the case of the free-radical form of metronidazole (technically, hydroxymetronidazole), the target is DNA; if this is damaged, the cell will die.

The key to the selectivity is that metronidazole is turned into the free radical by a protein only found in anaerobic bacteria and this reaction only happens where there is



little oxygen (as is found inside these organisms). They take the antibiotic up as it looks like a useful building block for their DNA and then they unwittingly activate it to the free radical form that kills them. This does not happen in humans, as we cannot turn it into its killer version and our cells have a lot of oxygen inside them. Thus this antibiotic is very useful in treating infections where other antibiotics will not work.

DRP

We often put diagrams of molecules in the 'Molecule of the Month' feature. In case readers aren't familiar with how these work, here is a bit of explanation.... With apologies to all who can explain much better than can your typist..... don't blame DRP, please!

Where capital letters such as N, O, P, or S appear, these are atoms of nitrogen, or oxygen, or phosphorus, or sulphur.

Where there is an angle where two black lines join, it means that there is a carbon atom at that point, which holds the whole thing together.

Single lines between atoms mean single bonds, double lines mean double bonds – just how the individual atoms 'hold hands' with their neighbours.

Molecules aren't flat, as shown in these diagrams: each type of atom has its own angles at which it reaches out to hold hands with its neighbours, which gives rise to interesting shapes that can be capable of clever and sometimes shape-altering gymnastics!
