



e talk a lot about failure. It is something we are super sensitive about. We have all had our failures. I am no exception and struggle most days with a fear of failing family, colleagues, church and God. Fear of failure is the reverse of what the gospel teaches but we are all extremely susceptible. It causes leaders to become risk averse and instinctively protect the institution, sometimes shamefully at the expense of the vulnerable. Farmers have told me that they don't want to be the one that lets the farm go under and church people vow to battle on because 'this mustn't fail on our watch'. The pressure of the ancestors, of tradition, of the sheer hard work of those who have gone before is colossal. Believe me, I do not want to be the Dean of Hereford under whose leadership a millennia of cathedral life goes horribly wrong. When Christ's Church fails, it is particularly heartbreaking, for it implies to others the failure of God.

The shame that accompanies personal and institutional failure scars us and trains us to count the cost, play it safe, and fear the unknown. Yet we know from experience that often failure leads to change and growth. Fear of failure among those called to live by the Spirit in the discomfort of risk leads to a lack of trust in God that literally asphyxiates His ability to create fresh possibilities, the most powerful of which is resurrection.

In the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus sweated over His anticipated cup of suffering, begging the Father to take it from Him. In the end, he chose to enter into the tragedy of his crucifixion. The long-awaited Messiah ended his mission in what looked like abject failure. Yet His willingness to trust God and submit to that failure led to the unimaginable expansion of God's kingdom. Even if our model of mission today also seems doomed to failure, we are called to step into it and trust in a fruitful future because that is what God promises and what Jesus did.

The physical resurrection of Jesus on Easter morning is both concrete testimony that God accompanies His people into the very depths and a blueprint for his plan to show that His love is stronger than all our faults, fears and failures. The Resurrection shows His capacity to redeem and make new life even out of death itself.

In these difficult times let us live and die as people who believe in Resurrection not out of naïve optimism but because we have seen the Risen Christ. If God can do that then all bets on personal and institutional failure are off and as Peter Pan observed, 'to die may be an awfully big adventure"

# Easter reflection

#### I love team sports and especially the game of rugby.

I watched transfixed at the recent England vs Wales match in the Six Nations with a mixture of happiness and sadness in equal measure. It is almost inevitable, at least for me, as I recognise that in any team sport so one sided, you can't have one without the other.

There is something about watching a team sport like rugby or cricket which draws me in. Maybe it's the mutuality and camaraderie that goes with it, sharing in success or failure, striving to improve, identifying giftings and talents within individuals and maximising the benefit for the whole team. I suspect there is something about sharing a burden to win a prize. All parts contributing towards the whole, with no part less important than the other.

How teams develop takes time and practice. They may change the way they play, they might even change formation, the whole way they are set up. None of this is important so long as they keep their eyes on the prize of being successful and growing, and in their ability to operate as a team.

To be successful it is not necessary to win. It is good to win, but it is not necessary in order to be successful.

In our work as the church here in Brown Clee we want to be successful, to grow our churches, but above all to remain focused on the prize that is Jesus. Everything we say or do is ultimately about the prize, a prize that we know we have won. The object for us is to grow as a team, but also to grow the team itself.

Success comes from compromise, through dialogue, through change and being adaptable to changing conditions. This is not easy stuff especially if we have played in the same position for a long time, or we are not confident about playing in a new position and maybe we don't recognise those gifts within us that we have been blessed with.

Lent is a good time to look at who we are as the Body of Christ, to listen to the voices around us but also from within, and pray for discernment and wisdom about how we grow as a team. Jesus's team played in many positions from fisherman to evangelists, from a persecutor of Christians to a great teacher. Over the years disciples have played upfront, others have played in defence, but the important thing in all of this is a willingness to play and to be successful as a team.

### Burwarton & District Garden Club

# Canna you do this??

**Once again** we were entertained and inspired by a talk from Mick Poultney in March. This was his third visit to our gardening club and Mick wanted to share his new passion and latest project which is growing Cannas and so he joined us to talk about **'Canna for Beginners'.** 



What first drew Mick to cannas was the

beautiful foliage and the stunning range of colours and sizes. He told us of his research to find a good source of healthy cannas, as it seems that they are all too often infected by viruses. The advice was to grow cannas from seed as this avoids virus contamination and we were reassured that they would flower in their first year. Mick showed us how to prepare seeds for sowing by filing the hard outer layer until the white inner layer is visible and then soaking them in rain water which should be changed every few days. Once shoots appear then they can be potted on into compost with vermiculite. Cannas grow from rhizomes and we were shown how to divide them and then seal the cut with runny honey and spray with neem oil to kill off pests. This should be done at the start of the season and then they should be stored in a greenhouse at around 10 degrees centigrade; they must be kept frost free. Mick has trialed leaving cannas outside over winter with mixed results. Some survived with protection from a wall and a heavy mulch whilst others failed. Therefore growing cannas in plastic pots which can be easily taken in and out of overwintering protection was recommended.

There are over 30 types of canna and Mick began by growing Durban which is one of his favourites, but he also recommended 'Tropicana Var Phasion which has leaves that are variously striped in green, purple, orange and pink, creating a dazzling effect that is further enhanced when the orange flowers appear. Mick's passion for cannas has also encouraged him to try to grow them as a house plant which he has successfully done by giving them much light from a south facing window and keeping them moist.

Mick's talk was as always entertaining, interesting and inspiring and I

would not be surprised if cannas began appearing in the gardens of members this summer.

**Our next meeting** is on Thursday 10th April where members have a chance to showcase their horticultural achievements in our Spring Show.

If you would like to join us then we meet in Stoke St Milborough village hall at 2.00pm for a cuppa and a chat with friends and then the show judging begins at 2.30pm. 



# Latin and the value of the useless

We have recently nominated a Wednesday lunchtime at work as a time to meet over a cup of tea and chat about whatever we want. Sometimes it may be about science, when people can share their joy (or disappointment) at their latest results. However, this week I had a lengthy conversation with a colleague about Latin. It arose out of some banter we had shared earlier in the week, about the word "viva", used in universities to mean an oral examination, but which is a Latin term. It turned out that both of us had done Latin at school; I took it for O-level, my colleague wanted to do the same but her parents thought it was of no use and made her do German instead. Quite a few years later, she still has a passion for Latin but has forgotten most of her German. I also enjoy Latin; I am not very good at it, but being able to get some sense from a Latin inscription written hundreds of years ago helps me connect with the person who wrote it. Of course, I do not have to do this, but I enjoy it. My colleague is thinking about taking up Latin again as she loves it so much. We owe our identity not just to the "useful" things we do, the objectives which can be measured, but to all our activities including the "useless". Thes things make us rounded people and they are vital (note the Latin root). As the 2nd century Christian teacher Irenaeus wrote (in Latin), "The glory of God is a human being fully alive".

# Letter from Uganda

Revd Sarah Cawdell writes:



#### Archbishop Janani Luwum Theological College, Gul

#### 3 March 2025

Praise God. It is a while since we wrote to you, and there has been some excitement, and then also setbacks – in the normal way of life.

To start with the excitement and progress, Simon has been working with an organisation: Texans and Ugandans in Mission, to bring water to the Diocesan Land, so that the coffee can be irrigated, and in time a poultry project also set up, and a house for a farm manager. The initial survey showed that a borehole was possible, the paperwork followed: an inspection from National Water, a letter of no objection and then finally a letter of permission. So last week the borehole drillers set up camp in the field with smart green tents, and expensive equipment.

The surveyor authorised the position and drilling commenced. They struck water at 17 metres, and continued again through another layer of rock until at 57 metres they came through the rock to an

underground sea. The water pipe was cleaned, and the first water presented to the Bishop. Now the borehole is capped and Simon is waiting for the release of funds to put in a solar powered motor, and a water tower.

At college term goes on well. The National Council for Higher Education didn't find space for us on the agenda in January, so College is still unregistered and will have to take the students to Arua for exams which

is still unregistered and will have to take the students to Arda for exams which is an expensive waste of resources, but there we are. I believe that the Council might meet again in April as they meet once a quarter. We are not yet informed. The students are resigned to the inevitable and it only remains to find the money to transport and feed them in Arua. Alongside this we have some of the inevitable problems of living in a community: some small thefts within, and one night the fence was cut and a student's motorbike was stolen. (Motorbikes are the main mode of transport here for getting to church, and visiting the parish). On the other hand we have been able to work together with some to make about six thousand bricks towards building the new classrooms. We have to try and use them before the rains set in, so we hope to dig and build the foundations before Easter.



Our third years leave in April. This is about half the college in effect. The twelve

from Nebbi Diocese will be ordained in June, and others from this Diocese in November. They have become fellow pilgrims and we will miss their presence. I don't know yet whether we will take on a new first year, but we pray that God will open a way.



We have had a good run of visitors this year, including Simon's sister and brother-inlaw. We are always glad to see people and share the developments in the college and on the land. There have been some noticeable changes in time we have been here thanks to your generosity and the gifts from the Presbyterian church in Korea.

The pigs are doing well. We had an interesting time recently with an invasion from a feral boar who broke in and attacked one of our boars. After trying to find the owner and checking with the authorities and feeding it for some days we slaughtered the offender and sold some pork to recoup the costs of the damage, allowing the remaining kilos to offer a 'balanced' diet to the students and staff. We are not being as successful as we hoped in selling on the weaned piglets as it is the dry season and food is not plentiful. We hope for rain soon, and then the market will pick up. Farming is more complicated than the theory would have us believe!

From time to time Simon visits the Archdeaconaries with Rev'd Opiyo Geoffrey to assess the progress of the Rooted in Jesus groups. In one recent visit they found a good number of groups with about 300 people using the Rooted in Jesus material over the three parishes. There was some wonderful testimony of deepened faith, and more consistent Christian living. The programme has taken hold across the Diocese and is making a good difference to the commitment and lives of Christians.

Thank you for your love and prayers as we continue here. We have now been here for two years and this time next year will be coming back to England, at least for six months leave. Please pray for us as we discern God's will for the following three years whether to return here, or find work in parishes in England. Pray for the students as they prepare for exams and the third years as they prepare for ordination. Pray for the release of funds from Operation Wealth Creation, or other sources so that the coffee mother garden, and plantation can be developed on the Diocesan Land.

We pray for you as you negotiate the difficulties and delights of life in your places.

God bless you and give you peace

# Fifty Years a Farmer



In the summer of 1954, Richard Jones, a fifteen-year-old agricultural student came home to Heywood Farm, from Shrewsbury Technical College, to work for his parents. He had been born, and lived all his young days on the farm, where his parents began in 1938, and he has kept a diary ever since. It offers a fascinating insight into farming experiences over nearly six decades, evoking long forgotten memories of changing machinery and finances, among the almost timeless repetition of seasons, animals, landscapes and weather conditions.

On 1<sup>st</sup> August 1954 there is a record of 24½ gallons of milk, in three churns, being bowled down to the milk stand on the side of the road. The milk would have gone to Fort Pendlestone, on the Bridgnorth – Telford road, which has since been converted from the old dairy. Before 1947 the cows had been milked by hand and Richard's mother had given him a quiet one to milk himself. Then the bucket milking machine came and twenty one cows could be tied up at any one time, in two cowsheds. They were all individually named, by Richard's mother, who also did the paperwork, always an important part of the farm routine. There was Granny Grey

One (because she went grey with age), Blue Light, Beauty, Judy, Blossom, Iris and many more names, which would have reappeared in the calving records kept by Mrs Jones. Heywood Farm on the Burwarton Estate was a 190-acre home to 21 sheep, 80 ewes (Clun Forest and Kerries), 1 Shropshire and 1 Oxford Down ram and 128 lambs. As well as the sheep, there were beef calv es and arable fields for feed crops. Many interesting facts emerge from Richard's records...

5<sup>th</sup> August 1954 – Richard's father did the milking in the morning, before going to Burwarton and District Agricultural

Show, where he was a steward having put up the sheep raining most of the day. Uncle Ben Price stayed on the farm, cleaning weeds from the mangold plants, which had previously been hoed by hand. At the show Mr Jones was exhibiting a Fordson Major diesel tractor, at the request of Herbert Bale Ltd of Kidderminster. It had been bought just previously, so the Burwarton Show was a perfect opportunity to show off their modern manufacturing. The family at this time were also using an Allis Chalmers baler, which produced little round bales, no longer seen. During 1954 about 3000 bales were made from approximately 30 acres,



pens the day before. It was





7<sup>th</sup> August – "went to Ditton Priors Auction to see the trade".

14<sup>th</sup> August – "went thistle cutting in the barn field and in the afternoon Dad and Uncle Ben went hedge brushing". A 'hedge bill' was used for the hedge trimming and a scythe and mowing machine for the thick patches of thistles.

21<sup>st</sup> August – "walked the lambs up to the Three Horseshoes market, they made £7 3s each. 40 lambs fetched £286." A lamb used to pay a man's wages for a week: now it takes four or five lambs.

Thank you to Richard for sharing his photographs and memories with Wheatland News. Richard still lives on the farm, now run by younger members of his family.

# Molecule of the Month:

# Insulin, its receptor - and the ballet dancer

When I was an undergraduate, specifically 1981/2 in my final year, I became particularly

interested in how insulin works. Insulin, as I am sure most people know, is one of the great triumphs of biomedical science over the last 100 or so years. It is sometimes called the "hormone of plenty" as it is released after we eat. Our food is digested and broken down into its component parts, sugars such as glucose and also lipids, the building blocks of fat. These pass into the blood but then they need to be taken up by our cells, where they are needed. The snag is that most of these building blocks, especially sugars such as glucose, cannot enter cells without some help; the cells need what are called "transport proteins" to take them up. This is where insulin comes in; it stimulates cells to produce these transporters. Without them, glucose accumulates in the blood but our cells starve to death. This is what happens in uncontrolled sugar diabetes. In juvenile diabetes, so called because it is apparent in children, the body can no longer produce insulin. The great breakthrough came after insulin was discovered and it was realised that it could be extracted from animals and given to diabetics as injections. Suddenly a previously fatal disease was treatable. Today, human insulin produced in a laboratory is normally used.

Back in 1981/2, following a lecture, I became fascinated as to how insulin worked. Insulin needs to interact with our cells and does this by binding to a protein that they make and which is found on their outer surfaces. Insulin binds to this and changes its shape; that in turn is detected by other proteins inside cells and causes two smaller proteins the production of the glucose transporters. I discovered that the insulin receptor was actually made of, it subunits. Both of these straddled the cell membrane, the "wrapper" around a cell. The head of both of these subunits were outside the cell and recognised insulin, the feet were inside and, by various mechanisms, indirectly activated the glucose transporters. Over the years I followed developments in the story of what was happening inside the

cells; for a period I worked with a colleague at Aston University to research this, but nobody really seemed to have any clear ideas on how insulin actually caused this.

My research interests eventually turned to other things. However, the science continued to move forward and I am writing this article just after returning from a seminar by a visiting scientist from Germany. After hearing this, now I finally know how insulin does its job!

The two subunits of the insulin receptor (yellow/blue/white) in the membrane of a cell (grey). On the right it has bound a molecule of insulin (green).

The two subunits of the insulin receptor initially come together to form an inverted V (See figure); they are in close contact outside the cell but are splayed apart inside the cell. What the most recent structures show is outside the cell there is not only the equivalent of a head and a body, but there are two arms, stuck closely to the "torso". Inside the cell are the equivalent of legs, splayed well apart. When insulin approaches the receptor, it flings its arms open to catch the molecules. At the same time, the legs come together and this movement is recognised by other proteins inside the cell, leading eventually to the activation of the sugar transporters.

And the connection with ballet? The speaker compared the receptor to a ballerina. At rest, her arms are by her side and her legs are apart. As she dances, she opens out her arms and brings her legs together. A beautiful analogy for some beautiful science that has brightened my morning!

Caring for God's Acre – flowers and the Church Calendar

n the past, plants were more important for people in charting the passing year than they are now. Many flowers have names that link their flowering time to that of the church calendar with several associated with Eastertide.

Greater stitchwort (Stellaria holostea) was also known as Easter Bell and Good Friday Grass is still a commonly used name for Field Wood-rush (Luzula campestris). Good Friday Grass is a frequent component of churchyard grassland, particularly in places with either acid or lime-rich soils. It's brush-like flowers are quite subtle but always appear in time for Easter. Another name for it is Sweep's Broom due to the shape of the flowers.

Another small but beautiful plant to look out for at this time of year is Wood Sorrel (Oxalis acetosella) which has several names including Cuckoo's Bread and Cheese, Granny's Sour Grass and Alleluia as its delicate white flowers appear between Easter and Whitsun, and its trefoil, shamrock-shaped leaves bring associations with the Holy Trinity.

Pasqueflower (Pulsatilla vulgaris) also blooms at Easter time, the name Pasque meaning 'of Easter'. It is now rare in the wild, found in a few places where there is ancient, undisturbed grassland on limestone. It is often associated with old earthworks such as barrows, hillforts and boundary banks and there was a legend that it grew where the blood of Danes or Romans had been spilt. \*

It's not only flowers that chart the passing months and the Christian calendar. St Mark's Fly (Bibio marci) is a long, black, shiny fly which hatches around St Mark's Day, April 25th. Large numbers of flies can be found in woodland edges, hedgerows and fields often mating in mid-air giving then the alternate name of Love Bug! They fly rather aimlessly with dangling legs, usually surviving as adults for about one week and getting eaten in large numbers, providing a ready food source. They are also an important pollinator of early flowering trees such as many fruit trees.

As you watch the spring unfurling, spare a thought for our ancestors who used nature as a calendar and lived much closer to a profusion of plants and animals than we do now. Perhaps this could be an inspiration to get involved in nature recovery in our much-depleted land.

The research includes new evidence for the early medieval wall paintings which once have graced the walls of St Mary's church – and an intriguing new interpretation of the Saxon carvings on the stone tympanum above the tower's internal 'east' door.
